PEAR GROWERS ARE FACING BIG LOSS

Will Be Fortunate If Price Received
for Crops Will Pay Cost of
Production—Picking to
Start At Once

Pear growers are now starting the task of picking their crops and by the first of the week it is expected that fruit will begin to arrive in Roseburg for shipment. Pear growers will be fortunate this year if they receive enough for their crops to pay expenses. The best price offered so far this year has been around \$23 per ton, the price offered by the local cannery which is buying for the Newberg Canning company. The local cannery will receive pears and ship them to Newberg and is offering \$23 per ton for firsts and \$13 per ton for seconds.

The low price this year is due largely to the immense California crop and to the loss sustained by the buyers last year. The growers last season were paid \$16 per ton. The sale of the crop was followed by a railroad strike, which caused a big loss to the buyers. This year the buyers are cautious, and with a crop of 15,000 tons in California there is an abundance of fruit on the market so that the price is not apt to be stimulated. It is estimated that about 17,000 tons of California's crop will be canned.

The Douglas valley crop this year is a record and from the standpoint of quality is the finest for many years. Most of the growers will have their pickers in the orchards on Monday.

The peach growers are also reporting an abundant crop, but the market is not as good as last year. Last season the fruit sold for \$1.25 per crate but this year will probably be 60 to 75 cents.

SMALLEST MACHINE GUN DEMONSTRATED IN ROME
(International News Service.)

ROME, Aug. 8.—A machine gun weighing only eight kilograms, said to be the lightest ever built, was demonstrated here recently at a local armament factory. It fires 250 shots per minute and is designed to take Italian cartridges. The gun was invented by a Dane named Madsen. The demonstration was witnessed by numerous Italian naval and military officials, and the minister and consul of Denmark. The experiments proved all claims made for the invention.

SALMON PACK IS SMALL
ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 8.—The Columbia River Packers' association canner ship Chillieth sailed from Neshakak river, Bristol bay, Alaska yesterday for Astoria, according to advices received here today. She is bringing an exceptionally small pack of salmon, it was stated. The fishing season on Neshakak river and in fact at all points in Bristol bay with the single exception of the Koguking river has been the poorest in years. While definite figures are not yet available, the pack of all kinds of salmon on the Neshakak river was said to be about 200,000 cases.

The advices were that the pack put up by the ten canneries on the Neshakak river would not exceed an average of 20,000 cases to the cannery. On the other hand, the catch at Koguking river is reported to have been much better than it was last season.

MOST CHARMING FISH STORY EVER TOLD
San Francisco, Aug. 4.—The most utterly charming fish story ever told, to which every other angler might just as well bow his head and quit, is told by John S. Montgomery, former mayor of Lodi. The mayor says he was fishing on the Rogue river in Oregon, and had a number of flies hooked into his hat-like fisherman do. A branch of a tree knocked the sky-piece off and it galloped down the stream out of sight. It was found a week later by a San Francisco fisherman on a salmon's head. RICH GIFTS GIVEN TO YALE UNIVERSITY

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Aug. 8.—Yale's 750 acres of land, near here, which is to be turned into a great college playground, came as a gift from Mrs. Sara Wey Tompkins, of Elmira, New York, as a memorial to her husband, the late Ray Tompkins, Yale 1884, and will be named "The Ray Tompkins Field."

Another gift, an old New England homestead at Lime Rock, on the Housatonic river, came from Miss Laura U. Barnum and William M. Barnum, Yale 1877, to be used as a resting place for convalescent home for retired members of Yale's faculty.

Both gifts were accompanied by suitable cash to develop the properties.

In addition to the realty, Yale has received more than four million dollars in cash, half for endowment and the rest for buildings.

DOG HABITUALLY CHEWED OF MASTER'S TOBACCO

Laddie, the property of James Mack, chews tobacco, is proud of it, and, moreover, likes it so well that he has developed the habit. Laddie will chew any brand but prefers his master's brand. He likes that so well that Mack has to limit his chews to three a day. Laddie is a combination Scotch collie and rat terrier.

FARM SENTIMENT MIXED
WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—"Farm sentiment is mixed with the south and east in a better frame of mind than the corn belt," the department of agriculture's monthly review says of the agricultural situation. "Such agricultural depression as exists is largely due to the disparity of prices of farm products and the prices of things farmers buy."

"It is not an easy season. The weather has been harassing and labor is scarce. The wheat belt is the sore spot. The present corn-hog relationship brings little advantage to farmers as a group since corn is not sold to the urban community but to other farmers. High priced corn in itself adds to the cost of producing animal products."

"Prices paid to producers decreased about 1.4 per cent during July."

JEFFERSON MEMORIAL TO EXHIBIT FAMED OLD BELL

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 8.—Handed down through generations of an old Indian family, a historic bell which figured in many important events is in the possession of Louis J. Manar, known as "Indian Lou," a medicine salesman. The bell, which is more than 200 years old, still retains its pure tone. The most important event in its history was when it was used in warning of the "attack of 1780" when the French and Indians met in St. Louis. St. Pierre used the bell during his regime in St. Louis, as well as many other persons who played important parts in the early history of the city. The bell will be placed on exhibit in the Jefferson Memorial soon.

"WIFE WILL NEVER KNOW," SAYS THIEF, SENTENCED

Light," the late president's favorite hymn, was sung by the male quartette of Calvary Baptist church. Scripture selections were read in the following order: The 23rd Psalm; Book of Micah, chapter six, eighth verse:

"He hath showed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with thy God."

(This is the verse that Mr. Harding kissed when he was inaugurated here, as it was his favorite verse.)

"And He showed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and of the Lamb."

"In the midst of the street of it and on either side of the river was there the tree of life which bears twelve manner of fruits and yielded her fruit every month; and the leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations."

"And there shall be no more curse. But the throne of God and of the Lamb shall be in it; and His servants shall serve Him."

"And they shall see His face; and His name shall be in their foreheads. And shall be no night there; and they need no candle, neither light of the sun, for the Lord God giveth them light and they shall reign forever and ever."

Then followed quotations from the Scriptures.

Dr. Montgomery prayed and "Nearer My God to Thee" was sung by the male quartette. Then the services were closed by the benediction, pronounced by Dr. Anderson. The quotations were from the Books of Numbers, sixth chapter, 24th to 25th verses:

"Lord bless thee and keep thee. The Lord make his face shine upon thee and be gracious unto thee. The Lord lift up his countenance upon thee and give thee peace."

Shortly afterward the people began trooping past to view the casket, guarded by four sentries, immovable as graven figures. At 6 p. m., a salute of twenty-one guns is fired, the body will be taken from the rotunda and borne to the funeral train for the last trip home.
