What God Says about—A Widow's Godly Life

"And Ruth said, Intreat me not to leave thee or to return from following after thee; for whither thou goest I will go and where thou lodgest I will lodge; thy people shall be my people and thy God my God."

Ruth, the gentle Moabitess, said this to her grief-stricken Jewish mother-in-law Naomi. (Oh, read it all for yourself; it's far better than any comment I can make upon it.)

But God wants you to read between the lines just here. Today it isn't so much what Ruth said as what induced her to say it. And that must have been Naomi's life. If you know Ruth as well as I do—and I hope you know her better—you will see that at this time in her life nothing could have induced her to say what she said and do what she did except that which she had observed of God in the life of her mother-in-law. She had no other Bible, she had no other guide.

It is true that Naomi, with her husband, had sinned in leaving Israel. But God's discipline must have been so meekly borne that the heathen girl said—"I want a people and a God that can make a woman able to live as my mother-in-law does."

Is anybody who reads this so living under adverse circumstances that some one alongside them says—"I want that woman's God for mine?" If so, thank God, and stick to it, friend. And if you, my Christian brother, are conscious of failure to live triumphantly in trouble, remember that all power to so live is yours through simple faith in a risen Christ.

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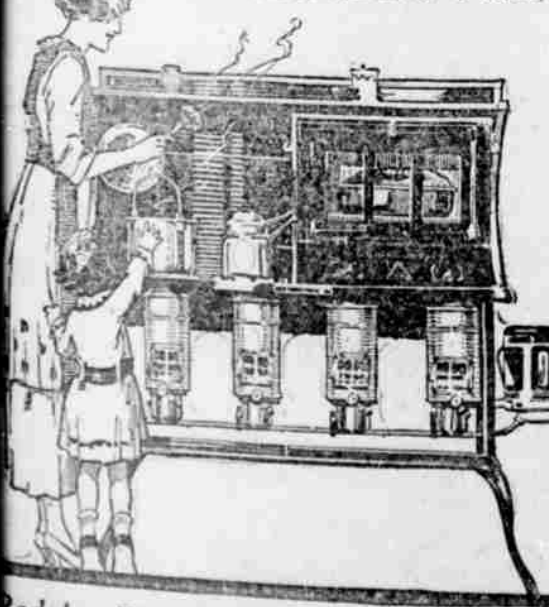
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
