ECONOMIC PROBLEMS TO COME BEFORE FRATERNAL CONGRESS

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 12.—World problems in economics will be discussed by many noted speakers when the annual meeting of the National Fraternal Congress is held at French Lick, Ind., August 27 to 30, according to Harry Wade, Indianapolis, president of the congress. James J. Davis, secretary of labor, who recently returned from a trip abroad, will be one of the speakers. Another will be Samuel M. Ralston, U. S. senator from Indiana.

The meeting at French Lick will mark the first time in the 25 years of the congress' existence that the convention has been held outside of a large city. The congress is composed of fraternal insurance societies of the United States and Canada which have a combined membership of more than six million men and women, with life insurance amounting to more than ten billion dollars, Mr. Wade says.

GOVERNMENT WILL NOT APPEAL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—The federal government will not appeal from the decision of the supreme court at St. Paul in the Southern Pacific-Central Pacific case, Attorney General Daugherty announced today. By declining to appeal the federal government permits the supreme court decree dissolving the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific merger to be overthrown by the Interstate Commerce Commission which held that the consolidation of the two lines was in the public interest.
