FATHER OF INJURED GIRL ASKS DAMAGES

EUGENE, Aug. 14.—An echo of the Fourth of July is heard in the suit of Herman L. Proits against Thomas J. Walker, filed in circuit court by Potter, Foster and Inman, attorneys for plaintiff.

Proits asks recovery of \$691 said expended as the result of a torpedo explosion that injured the eye of Jane E. Proits, his six and a half year old daughter. The complaint states that on July 4, 1922, Walker placed a torpedo on the Oregon Electric tracks in front of Proits' home at 652 Fifth avenue west, and when a train passed over and exploded it at 6:30 o'clock, part of the metallic substance contained in the torpedo was hurled by the explosion a distance of 50 feet to the Proits' front porch, where the little girl was with the rest of the family at the time.

Samus sought in recovery are itemized as follows: \$500 doctors' and nursing bills; \$100 lost time for father and mother; \$15 railroad fare to Portland where specialist was consulted; \$40 hotel bills in Portland while daughter under specialist's care; \$25 hospital.

GOES MERRILY ON—ENDS THIS WEEK

EMPT TO SCALE "ROOF OF CONTINENT" BY PLANE

(By Associated Press.)
ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Aug. 13.—At McKinley, the highest elevation on the North American continent, the first of a series of flights was made for the purpose of securing air photographs of the famous and the national park which lies to the west. Close-up photographs of herds of mountain sheep and great Alaskan brown bear which roam the mountain fastnesses will be taken.

The start of the trip will be made at McKinley station, at the entrance to the park, where there is a natural lake. Other landing places also being located in various sections of the park, where additional photographs will be taken.

The trip from Fairbanks to the McKinley station, the explorers will photograph the great mountain ranges, the great Alaskan brown bear which roam the mountain fastnesses will be taken.

At the Arctic during the latter part of August, and the reindeer herds are in broad Pass. Entering the plateau several miles square the summit, and if the ice will, actually make a landing on "Roof of the Continent." 20,309 above the sea.

HEADS BLACKEN RIVER—SAYS GRANTS PASS MAN

GRANTS PASS, Aug. 14.—Tons of heads are congregated in the river canyon near the mouth of the creek, awaiting cooler water as ascending the river. This was brought back to the city by a boat from a trip by boat to Gold. The trip was made to take

two government engineers to the coast in order that they might make a topographical map of the river. In the party were Bishop Moorhead and C. Gardner, engineers with the geological survey, Claude Barden, Harold Briggs and R. W. Long. Two boats were taken down, Mr. Barden and Mr. Briggs having charge of the boats.

The topographical map is now completed from the head of the Rogue to the mouth, according to the engineers. They have been working on it all summer and have now completed their work. No trouble was experienced in the last trip, although there were thrills at times. People along the lower river say that the stream is the lowest it has been in years for this time of the season.

Mr. Barden says that the river is fairly black with the steelheads in places, the fish being thick from Whiskey creek to the coast. They could not be induced to rise to a fly, however. Sixteen days were taken to the trip, the boat being sold at the coast and the stage being taken to Marshfield and back home.

OFFICIAL SPANKER FOR SAN FRANCISCO CHINESE
