OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 15.—The same bogus check artist who "worked" one of the largest jewelry stores in Olympia about 10 days ago by posing as George Melford, moving picture director for the Famous Players-Lasky corporation, here with his company to take pictures in the vicinity, made something of a clean-up in Kelso and Longview last week. It was learned here today.

When a smooth-talking young man visited Talcott Brothers' jewelry store in Olympia recently and started picking presents to be sent by the store to his mother and to a sister, he told an interesting tale of having Jack Holt, Jacqueline Logan and other movie people on location at Boston Harbor, a small townsite on Puget sound, seven miles by water from Olympia. They were to shoot scenes for Beach's "The Iron Trail," and there would be some Olympia scenes included, showing Talcott Brothers' store and the Hotel Olympian, and when he bought \$84 worth of goods

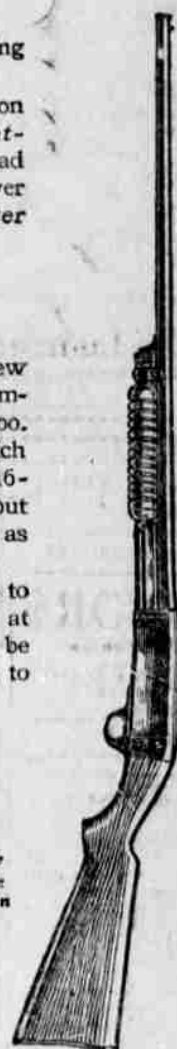

The man was traveling with a Los Angeles resident in a big car, and upon stopping here put up a story of having lost his pocket book on the way to Roseburg and succeeded in passing two checks, one for \$10 and one for \$15. He traveled as far as Seattle with the Los Angeles man and then left the car. He has been sought for some time for his various activities. Ray Clark, of the Hotel Olympian, was formerly connected with the Umpqua hotel here.

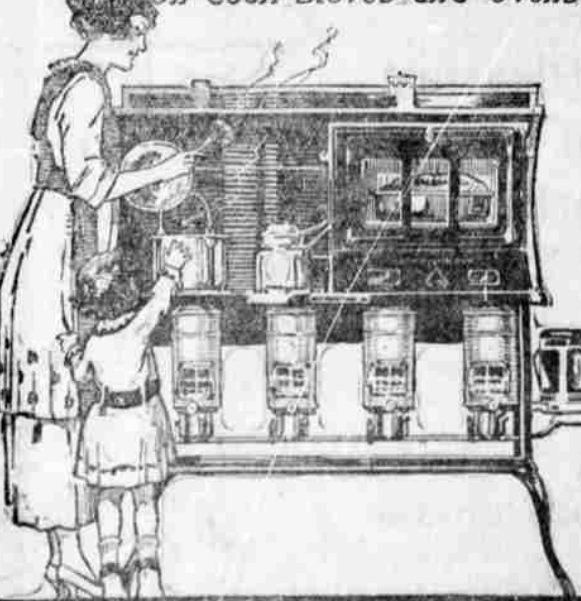
