SANTA BARBARA FIRE REVIVED BY WINDS

SANTA BARBARA, Calif., Aug. 16.—The forest fire which has been burning in the Santa Barbara forest for two weeks and was believed under control, has been revived by a fierce wind from the north last night and has swept over twenty sections. Early today the forest officials reported that the flames were driving across the eastern end of the great San Marcos ranch and were coming towards this city. Burning southward and westward on a front of twenty miles, it was necessary to rush additional fire fighters into the forest reserve today.

IMPORTED MOOSE ARE DOING FINE

MARSHFIELD, Aug. 15.—The five moose brought to the coast section a year ago this month and liberated in the district between the Siuslaw and the Umpqua in the lake section, have done well. District Game Warden A. M. Fish from reports sent from that section.
The moose were fed last winter and before, but this spring feed became so plentiful that the moose failed to visit the headquarters that had been established for them and continued to range over a wider area. They are said to be growing and keeping fat.
The animals are seen often by people of that vicinity, who are interested in their propagation, and it is not believed that hunters will kill them for the neighborhood is taking much pride in having the moose in their territory and everybody keeps track of them and watches for possible poachers.
