SUTHERLIN MAY
GET NEW OIL WELL

D. E. Olson of Eugene Said to
Be Ready to Sign Con-
tract for Drilling

LOCATION IS INSPECTED

Standard Drill Outfit May Be
Located on Ground Within
Sixty Days, According
to Announcement

A decidedly optimistic turn in the affairs of the Sutherland Oil and Development company occurred the first of the week with the appearance here of Robert F. Campbell, well known geologist, accompanied by D. E. Olson, the well known oil operator, who is at present putting down two or three wells in the vicinity of Cottage Grove and Eugene, says the Sutherland Sun.

Messrs. Olson and Campbell arrived here late Monday afternoon from Eugene in Mr. Olson's large touring car, which is equipped with a radio apparatus, and proceeded at once to a point east of town where Mr. Campbell is desirous that a test well be drilled. Mr. Olson, who is an expert geologist, made a careful investigation of the location and then used an apparatus which he has for locating oil-bearing sands. The apparatus, according to Mr. Olson, indicated conclusively the presence of oil.

Later in the evening a meeting of the board of directors of the Sutherland Oil and Development company was held at the business place of August Vogelpohl, at which all the members of the board and Messrs. Olson and Campbell were present. After going over some details, Mr. Olson made a proposition to bring in a standard drilling equipment, erect a 110-foot derrick and sink a hole to a depth of 4,200 feet if necessary, providing the leases held by the Sutherland Oil and Development company were turned over to him and he was given six months' time in which to begin actual operations. Mr. Campbell, who at present holds a contract with the Sutherland Oil and Development company for putting down a well, agreed to surrender his contract and interest in the leases to Mr. Olson if the offer of the latter was accepted by the directors.

Mr. Olson stated that while he asked for six months' time in which to begin operations, it was not his intention to delay the work any longer than absolutely necessary, and that it might be possible for him to begin operations within thirty days or less. It was pointed out that while he was granted a year's time at Eugene, actual work was under way in less than thirty days, and the well near that city is now down over six hundred feet. Mr. Olson thought it might be necessary to drill to a depth of 4,200 feet before encountering oil in a commercial quantity, and in order to provide for drilling to that depth, he would, if his proposition was accepted, install a standard rig weighing one hundred tons and erect a derrick to a height of 110 feet.

The board of the local company asked time to give the matter a little consideration, and agreed to have two of its members meet with Mr. Olson in Eugene on Wednesday. At a meeting of the board Tuesday it was decided that if Mr. Olson would give the board a guaran-
tee he would put down a hole 4,200 feet if necessary, they would enter into a contract and turn over the leases on approximately five

thousand acres of land in this vicinity.

E. H. Rothwell and W. F. Kernia, members of the local board, went to Eugene Wednesday, and Mr. Olson readily agreed to the terms of the contract, which, among other things, provides for a forfeit in case actual operations are not started within six months. Mr. Olson, who will visit Sutherland today (Friday) to go over the leases with the board of directors, assured Messrs. Rothwell and Kernia during their interview Wednesday, that he would probably have the work here well under way within sixty days.

For the successful issue in this matter, whereby a test oil well east of town is now practically assured, much credit is due to Robert F. Campbell, who has worked almost unceasingly for several months to bring about this end. That he succeeded in interesting a man of Mr. Olson's financial ability to go thru with the proposition, and a man whose reputation for square dealing is unquestioned, is a matter of congratulation.

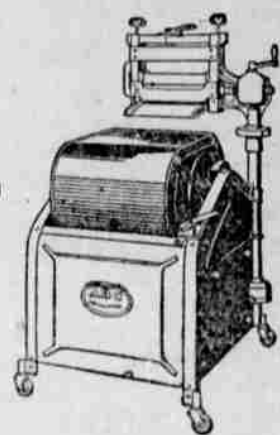
