ENGINEERS DID NOT LIKE MONKEY ACTION ENGINES

The progress of transportation has in the past few years been one of the marvels of the times. In the Roseburg Review of November 29, 1924, appears the following:

"Two of the new engines to be used by the S. P. lines in Oregon between Ashland and Portland have come out of the shops at Sacramento, one of them went north Monday and the second '1179' came up Tuesday and pulled out last evening's northbound passenger train from here and will likely be in Eugene McCarthy's charge permanently, as his old engine, '1175,' along with another one of the old ones, has been ordered to the shops to be rebuilt. The new engines are what is known in railroad slang as 'monkey motion' or 'Stephens' valve,' and are so powerful that their use will do away with the double headers or pushers now required on passenger trains at several points between Portland and Ashland."

These old "monkey action" engines were the last word in locomotive construction in 1894 and their length of 48 feet was considered too great for the many curves on the road. The railroad men did not like them, at first, as is shown by the following from the same paper:

"The two big engines now on the S. P. are run between Roseburg and Grants Pass by Engineers Waite and Porter. The former's was laid up several days with a broken main rod but is back on the road again. It seems to be the intention of the company to put six of these engines on between Roseburg and Portland to take the place of eight smaller ones now in use. The two running south to take the place of three now running there. They will then take off two of the helpers here and one at Grants Pass, throwing three crews out of employment. The engineers do not take kindly to the big machines, believing them to be rather risky things to run on, especially south through the canyon. They say it is impossible to see any distance ahead on the track, and that they will probably run into obstructions more frequently than heretofore."

These old diamond stack engines were scrapped long ago and today on the S. P. another change is being planned and within a few more weeks the huge Decapods or 2-10-2 engines, which the Southern Pacific is starting to use will be run south of Roseburg. Where the old "monkey action" engine was 48 feet in length, the new locomotives are 68 feet long.

With such progress within thirty years, who can say what the next few years will bring forth?

WILL OF LATE DR. TOYE IS FILED AT COQUILLE

COQUILLE, Ore., Aug. 21.—The will of Dr. W. A. Toye of Marshfield was probated today. He left the entire estate, except \$100 to St. Monica's parish and \$50 to Rev. Father Sheridan, to his daughter Catherine. It provided that W. J. Conrad, W. U. Douglas and A. E. Adelsperger as administrators should look after it until Catherine is 25 years old. His sister, Mrs. Sarah Costello, is appointed guardian of Catherine.

Conrad, Adelsperger and Douglas were also appointed guardians of the estate of Catherine Toye which was established through her inheritance of about \$10,000 life insurance. The will was made two days prior to Dr. Toye's death.

OIL SEPARATOR INSTALLED

Installation of \$5,000 oil separator has been completed at the S. P. roundhouse and will serve to prevent so much oil from being wasted and will also prevent the sewers in that vicinity from being filled with oil as in the past. Under the new arrangements all drainage from the roundhouse and yards goes to the separator, where by specially designed machinery the oil is separated from the water and other waste matter and is recovered. The installation of this apparatus will result in a big saving to the company.
