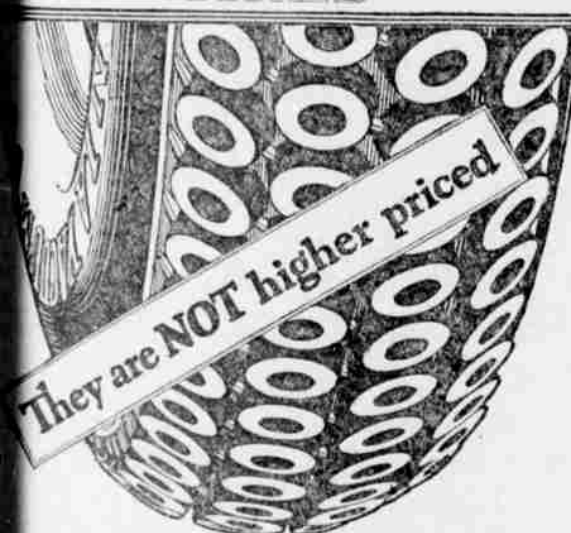

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SUTHERLIN SCHOOLS TO OPEN NEXT MONTH

SUTHERLIN, Aug. 24.—Whether the Sutherlin public schools will open on September 19th or 17th, has not yet been definitely decided by the school board, but it is probable that some definite announcement of the opening date will be made next week.

Some months ago it was announced that the opening date would be on September 19th, but recently requests have been made that the date of opening be postponed at least a week later, by reason of the prairie harvest coming on, which creates a big demand for pickers. There is a position to know, however, state that the indications are that the prairie harvest will be a little later this season than a year ago, and as it continues for two or three weeks it would bring the opening of school in October. If postponement is made on account of the harvest, the late opening would advance the closing date into warm days of June when pupils have no inclination to attend school or give much attention to their studies when they are there.

The indications are that the attendance at the local high school will be considerable larger the coming school year than for several years past, as at least two outside districts will send their students here.

The list of teachers announced for the coming year are as follows:

First and second grades—Miss Adeline Stewart of Roseburg, who has taught here for several years and given excellent satisfaction.

Third and fourth grades—Miss Margaret Traver of Creswell, graduate of the State Normal school.

Fifth and sixth grades—Miss Gladys Durland of Roseburg, a graduate of the State Normal school.

Seventh and eighth grades—Miss Florence Johnson of Glendale, who has given excellent satisfaction in the local school for the past two years.

High school—Principal Oscar Gorrell, who has given splendid satisfaction as superintendent of the Sutherlin schools the past three years will be assisted in the high school classes by Miss Glenn Frank, of Eugene, graduate of the University of Oregon, who gave such good satisfaction here last year. It is expected that the third teacher for the high school will be selected during the coming week. Many students in the school will regret to learn that Mrs. Gorrell has decided not to teach the coming year.
