J. E. Leonard, who resides in Olalla, was in town the latter part of this week transacting business matters.

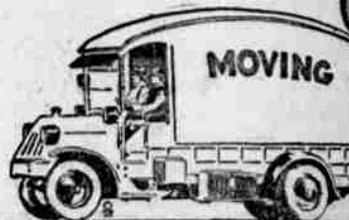

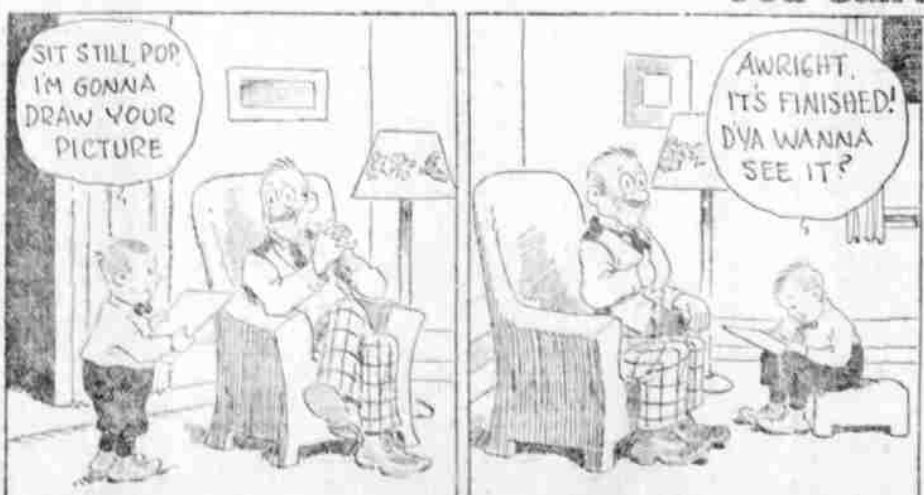

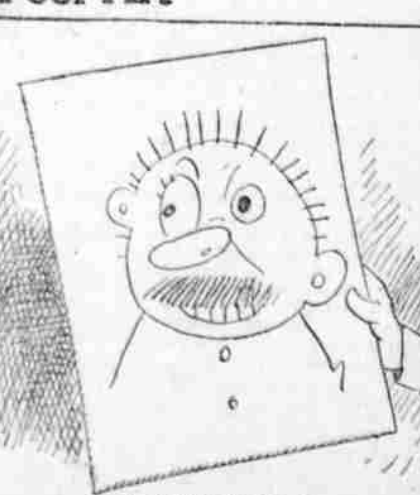
