MAYOR BAKER WAGES WAR ON NARCOTICS (By Associated Press.) PORTLAND, Aug. 25.—Mayor Baker today proclaimed the week beginning September 1st, "anti-narcotics week" in Portland. It is claimed that the edge of the shovel cut clear through the top of the skull, besides inflicting a deep slash in the scalp. TOMMY GIBBONS TO BE IN ROSEBURG Sam Was Certainly Surprised.
