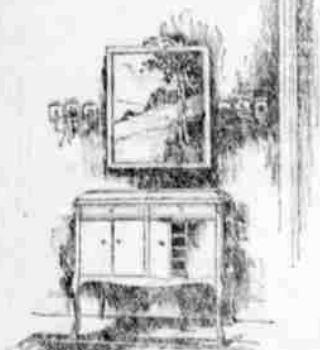

SUTHERLIN REPORTS GOOD PEAR CROP

Sutherlin Valley growers are busy this week harvesting one of the finest crops of pears ever produced in this valley. The fruit is of a large uniform size and exceptionally free from acid or bluish as a result of which there will be comparatively few pears here of the No. 2 grade.

Picking started last Thursday, and before noon on Monday over sixteen hundred boxes had been received at the local plant of the Oregon Growers. A large force of sorters have been busy on the grader since last Friday, and on Monday afternoon the first carload was ready for shipment to the cannery at Salem. This car contained 1100 boxes. Approximately five thousand boxes had been received at the plant Tuesday noon, and it was estimated that at least five thousand more would be received by the end of this week.

day, and up to Thursday noon had received about three thousand boxes, practically all of which will grade No. 1 class. The Growers Union will ship to California canneries and export to send out their first carload on Saturday. J. C. Sanderman has been selected as manager of the Growers' Union and Cecil E. Carr has been engaged as foreman of the local plant.

Two carloads of empty fruit boxes were received here this week from Guy Conner Fruit Company, Medford, consigned to David Griener and C. L. Wench. The Growers' Union also received one carload of empty boxes.

The severe storm of Tuesday will cut down the estimated pear crop in Sutherlin Valley to some extent. The crop was nearly half harvested before the storm struck the valley, and while the orchards just east of town escaped serious damage, the fruit on the trees three or four miles out was practically ruined. The orchards west of town were not damaged to any extent.
