They're Pretty in St. Louis Approaching Air Congress Underworld Secret Service Faithful Service Repaid

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 28.—Who is the prettiest girl in St. Louis?
There's a question on which many judges are trying to reach an impartial decision in this metropolis a product of the old South and the new West to determine the city's representative Miss St. Louis, at the Atlantic City Beauty tournament to select Miss America.

While with the West is generally associated wild-eyed politicians of the "farm bloc" who are perpetually starting revolts in the old parties, and that type of young woman popularly recognized as "corn fed," judging from the entries so far in the Miss St. Louis contest, a beauty will be sent to Atlantic City who has more than a fighting chance to humble the fair women of the self-acknowledged "beauty centers" out east.

At every bathing beach in St. Louis and environs elimination contests are being promoted to determine the candidates for the all-city beauty tournament. Some selections already have been made which may make the world forget that St. Louis was made famous by a certain brew—Anheuser-Busch (perhaps you remember the name), or that they have stockyards, Hornsby and George Sisters out here.

The international air races here October 1, 2, and 3 are expected to see assembled a distinguished throng of airmen from the United States, Great Britain, France and Italy that will surpass anything of the kind ever held in this country.

Secretary of the navy Denby, slated for an address at a banquet under auspices of the National Aeronautic Association, is taking a keen interest in the aero congress, it was learned from Washington, and plans to come with a formidable array of planes.

The St. Louis meet is expected to be highly significant from the standpoint of the government in providing for a national defense. From the commercial viewpoint the contests also will be of great importance. The air circus will give government officials and commercial interests a chance to compare the American airplane development with that of the important foreign powers, as well as to note progress made in the last year.

The navy this year wants to retrieve its laurels lost to the army last year at Detroit. Special Curtiss racing planes now being built are expected to develop a speed of more than 250 miles an hour.

With the army holding the world's speed, non-stop and endurance records the task and goal set by the navy for accomplishment is in itself sufficient to develop great interest in the St. Louis contests.

To get by the police isn't much of a problem for the bootleggers in high-powered automobiles, or fast motorboats plying between the South and Canada, but to run the gauntlet of the gangsters and the so-called "parasite bootlegger" who preys on the wet goods smuggled in by rum-runners, often means a gun battle to death.

A more refreshing story—that points to appreciation often shown though seldom publicly recorded—is that of a faithful druggist of St. Louis who labored untriflingly twenty five years at a modest salary and then as a reward was given the store in which he worked.

A quarter of a century ago, Joseph F. Lauer, at the age of thirty years went to work as a pharmacist for Victor Dieselz, Lager, a bachelor gave his time and efforts religiously to his work. His employer became wealthy and as years went by more and more left his store to the employe.

One morning a short time ago Dieselz walked into the store. Calling the clerk he said:

"Joseph, the business is yours."
"Joseph," accepted the "humble gift." He regretted, as did his former employer, that the story had "gotten out," as they said it was simply a "private transaction between old friends."

MENNONITES TO FORM COLONY

(By Associated Press.)
LOS ANGELES, Aug. 28.—A group of Russian Mennonites now living in Los Angeles and vicinity is preparing to establish a religious colony in northern Mexico. The matter already has been taken up with Leandro Garza Loal, Mexican consul here, and the promise received that the Mexican government will afford the usual facilities to settlers. A committee of five Mennonites soon will leave to inspect possible sites for the colony.

The heads of more than 100 families already have registered for the migration and as many more are expected to take similar action, it is stated. The Russians are said to favor going into Chihuahua, near the colonies of several thousand Mennonites who recently went there from Canada, but if they cannot obtain the necessary land there, they will go into Durango or to the coast of Sinaloa.
