

MYSTERY SHROUDS DROWNING OF BOYS

Two Brothers Lose Lives in Five Feet of Water—Last Seen on Saturday Night—Were Swimming Alone.

COTTAGE GROVE, Aug. 28.—Mystery surrounds the recovery last night of the bodies of Cash and Clarence Willis, brothers, 21 and 19 years, who were drowned Saturday night and when they did not return it was believed they were camping.

The two young men were last seen about 5:30 Saturday evening when they started in their car to go swimming. This fact, coupled with the condition of the bodies recovered tonight indicates that the drowning took place about six o'clock Saturday evening.

Not until late yesterday was any alarm held for the boys, since their father believed that instead of coming home they had stayed with a boy hater on which both had been working. Men on the haling machine, in turn, had thought the two young men at home.

A party of Cottage Grove people who picked up the car Sunday morning noticed a Ford car standing there, but suspicion was not aroused until the same party returned for another picnic tonight. Seeing the car still there, fear of some untoward event was held by several members of this party. Aid was summoned from Cottage Grove. Over 100 residents here responded to the call and hastened to the creek to aid in the search.

Discovery of the boy's clothes up the creek heightened suspicion of the auto party. A search of the river, said to be about seven feet deep at the picnic ground, followed, with the result that the two bodies were found about 5:00 tonight in Row river.

Both young men had presumably been swimming without clothing, a change of underwear left with their clothes indicating that the youths intended the plunge as a Saturday night bath.

No definite cause for drowning could be assigned, but the presumption was that one had may have been tricken with cramps and his brother attempting to rescue him, went down with the imperiled youth.

OVERHEAD CROSSING PETITION DRAWN

The petition for an overhead crossing above the S. P. tracks in south Roseburg has been prepared together with blue prints and all necessary data, and as soon as the signatures are attached will be forwarded to the public service commission. The city is asking for permission to construct an overhead crossing at the extension of South street in order that the crossing may be used as an approach for the proposed Umpega Park bridge. The petition must be submitted to the public service commission, which calls a meeting of the railroad officials and city officers and proceeds to determine the amount that the city and company should pay in establishing this crossing. Because of the great amount of work ahead of the commission it will probably be several weeks before the hearing is obtained. The city was assisted in the preparations of the petition and the other necessary documents by District Attorney George Neuner. The county is participating in the construction of the bridge by expending the sum of \$10,000.

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TEST EINSTEIN THEORY SEPT. 10

Astronomers Will Make Special Study of Eclipse to Test Out Theory

INSTRUMENTS PLACED

Astronomers With Apparatus and Camp Equipment Are Now on Way to Mt. Hamilton to View Eclipse

BERKELEY, Cal., Aug. 28.—Several expeditions of astronomers will test the Einstein theory during the eclipse of the sun on September 10, according to President W. W. Campbell of the University of California here. Many students, President Campbell said, consider repetition and confirmation highly desirable.

Astronomers with instruments and camp equipment are now on their way from Lick observatory, Mt. Hamilton, Cal., to Lower California to observe the solar eclipse. Professor William H. Wright, of Lick, is in charge of the expedition. The party is headed for Ensenada, a Lower California seaport about seventy-five miles southeast of San Diego.

The University of California will have fellow observers in the path of the eclipse. From Flagstaff, Ariz., the Lowell observatory will send an expedition under Director V. M. Slipher, which will station itself within a few miles of the University of California party, which is officially known as the Crocker expedition. The Yerkes observatory of the University of Chicago, the Washburn observatory of the University of Wisconsin, and the McCormick observatory of the University of Virginia will establish their stations on the island of Catalina, near the port of Avalon. The Mount Wilson observatory will have its chief observing station near Point Loma, San Diego, with smaller detachments at two or three places in the vicinity. The Sproul observatory of Swarthmore college, Pennsylvania, will watch the eclipse at Cuernavaca, in central Mexico.

Because of the total eclipse of the sun, the American Astronomical society, the membership of which includes practically all American astronomers, will hold its annual meeting in Pasadena and Los Angeles on September 17, 18, and 19.

In speaking of the arrangements made by the observers, President Campbell, who is director of the Lick observatory, says: "The sun will become totally obscured by the moon on September 10 at about 1 p. m. Totality on the central line of the shadow will last three minutes and thirty-five seconds. At San Diego and Catalina the eclipse will be shorter, lasting two and one-half minutes, more or less.

"A straight line on the map of California through Santa Barbara and Oceanside will define the northeast edge of the shadow path. The farther to the northeast of this line an observer stands, the larger will be the part of the sun left uncovered by the moon; in other words he will view a partial eclipse, the uncovered portion of the sun being for him a thin crescent. In the vicinity of San Francisco the moon at maximum eclipse will cover about 96 per cent of the sun's disk; at Los Angeles, about 98 per cent. It should be realized that a partial eclipse possesses very little interest, while a total eclipse is one of nature's most interesting phenomena.

"A total solar eclipse provides opportunity to study those parts of the sun which cannot be seen at other times. The solar appendage known as the sun's corona, consisting of brilliant streamers extending outward from the sun in all directions, is the subject of special interest. There is thus the opportunity to apply one of the tests for the Einstein theory, as outlined by Einstein himself. If the theory is correct, then the image of the stars photographed in the darkness of the sun's corona should appear on the photographic plates to be very slightly displaced from their normal positions by virtue of the sun's gravitational influence upon the stellar rays of light when they pass close to the sun on their way down to the eclipse instruments, and also by the way of the effect of the general curvature of space in the vicinity of the sun.

"Several of the expeditions, notably those from Mount Wilson and from Swarthmore college, will repeat the observations for this purpose made by the Lick observatory at the eclipse of 1918 and 1922, and by the British observers in 1919. The Lick observatory is not placing the Einstein theory problem on its program this month. The consequences, however, of the Einstein theory are of such extreme importance in the fundamental physical sciences that many students of the subject consider repetition and confirmation highly desirable.
