

IMMINENT DRAIN WOMAN IS DEAD

Laura Ann Snell, widow of late Edward Snell, an honored pioneer, died at her home, 1001 N. 10th, Tuesday morning, August 28, at the age of 77 years, 11 months and 11 days.

Death was due to troubles incident to old age and she had been in health for several months. Mrs. Snell was highly respected and her death was a great loss to the community.

Funeral services were held at the home of Mrs. Snell, Tuesday afternoon, August 29, at 2 o'clock. Burial was in the Roseburg cemetery.

NEW DAIRY LAW IS NOW IN EFFECT

In discussing the new dairy law which was enacted by the last legislature, B. W. Cooney, county agent, states that this law makes it a misdemeanor to sell, trade, or stand for public service any dairy bull that is not purchased and registered as such.

NOW TIME FOR LAST COOLING MOTH SPRAY

An examination of the clothing moth traps has been made by B. W. Cooney, county agent, and shows that the moths are laying eggs in maximum amounts. This means that worms will appear in full force about September 1st. The last cooling moth spray should be applied to clothes without any delay in order to secure control of this most injurious insect pest. The materials to be used consist of 5 pounds of lead arsenate to each 200 gallon tank, also add sufficient kerosene to give a good film of oil on the water. The arsenic was deposited in drops upon the clothing.

The control spray applied up to date will be entirely lost if the worms are allowed to break through the guard at this time. If any spray represents crop insurance this one certainly takes the major place.

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Section 1 of the law gives a clear interpretation of the meaning which it is intended to convey:

"Section 1.—No person, firm or corporation shall sell, give away, buy or accept for dairy breeding use any dairy bull that is not registered pure blooded breeding and licensed to be sold within the state of Oregon. Further, no person, firm or corporation shall use or offer for use for public service in this state any dairy bull that is not registered pure blooded breeding. The term 'public service' is defined in this law as meaning the breeding of any cow or cows in herds consisting of more than five cows not owned by the owner or owners of said bull or bulls."

The bull or bulls must be registered and licensed by the Dairy Bull Registration board, Corvallis, Oregon, and there is a fee of \$1.00 required for each animal so registered. Copies of this law are available by writing to the registration board, or to Mr. Cooney, county agent.

This law was so designed to build up the quality of the dairy stock in the state by the use of a pure blooded breeding merit. There is quite a severe penalty for the violation of this law, and everyone engaged in the dairy industry should comply strictly with the requirements as set forth.

ROUNDUP WILL BE BIGGER THAN EVER

PENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 30.—The prize list for the Pendleton Round-Up, to be held September 20, 21, and 22, will be greater this year than ever before.

All events will command their cash and merchandise prizes, but in addition four beautiful saddles, triumphs of the saddle-makers' art, will be given. One presented by the Union Pacific System, is for the winner of the world's championship bucking contest. Another, presented by Hamley & Co., is for the winner of the Northwest bucking contest, while a third, presented by Happy Canyon, the night show held during the Round-Up, will be presented the winner of the steer roping.

The fourth saddle will be a ladies' saddle, presented by Al Kader Shrine temple, of Portland to the winner of the ladies' relay race on Thursday, the first day of the Round-Up. The Shriners, a thousand strong, are to be in Pendleton on the Wednesday preceding the Round-Up for a big Wild West ceremonial, and will remain on Thursday to see the show. They will come to Pendleton in three special trains from Portland.

This year will mark a precedent, for a prize is being offered the meager buckler in the big show. The prize will be a bag of Umatilla county oats, and the donor is Phillip Ashton Holman, author of "The Cowboy," and whose articles have appeared in the Saturday Evening Post and other publications. He visited the Round-Up last year and decided that the buckers' which share honors with the human performers, should receive a prize for their efforts. The bag of oats will bear a silver plate with the name of the donor and of the lucky winner.
