FARMERS' PICNIC VERY ENJOYABLE

Regardless of their party affiliations. "The individual should be on the same basis as the railroad who is guaranteed 6 per cent on his investment by the government. Why shouldn't the farmer at least receive 2 per cent?"

"Regarding the marketing of prunes and the new proposed prune exchange, organized for the purpose of providing markets for the crop, it would be well to explain where the idea originated. The Portland Chamber of Commerce committee on agriculture, confronted by reports from various sections of the state, realized the danger which is facing the growers of Oregon. They called a meeting of the organized and independent growers to discuss market plans. No ulterior motive was behind the move, just a sincere desire to aid the fruit growers of the state to dispose of their crops at a fair profit. I attended the meeting in Portland and while I was skeptical at the first I am now convinced that some action is necessary on the part of the grower. A committee was appointed to formulate a plan and their report embodied three features, advertising, a standard pack, and selling.

"It was decided to form a prune exchange, composed of units. The maximum liability to the members will probably now exceed a half a cent per pound and in the contract an agreement is contained which makes it possible for the grower to cancel the contract upon 30 days' notice."

Mr. Neuner explained the exchange from every angle and made it clear that this action was necessary. He stated that the cooperative organizations of the state had offered to join.

"You have a right to demand a fair return for your labor," he said in closing.

Dr. C. H. Bailey, editor of the Oregon Grange Bulletin, made a short talk and announced that the last Saturday in September would be a red letter day for the farmers of Douglas county. On that day the Pomona Grange will hold an all-day session at the armory in Roseburg, which will be attended by Governor Walter Pierce and State Market Agent Spence. He urged all of the farmers and business men to attend the meeting and to hear these two prominent men talk.

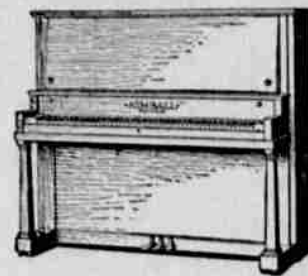
Professor Clayton Long of the Oregon Agricultural college made a short talk to the picnicers along the lines of cooperation. Professor Long is an authority on orchards. He said that overproduction is causing the present market conditions, stating that there were not too many prunes but too few buyers for the crop. He said that all of the cooperative organizations should be linked together. "The prunes of today are of a lower quality and smaller than they were eight years ago," he said. "The orchards should be thinned out and the remaining trees properly pruned. Soil fertility should be built up and the organic matter which has been farmed out replaced. This can be accomplished by planting cover crops. The cover crops in Lane county last year increased over 1200 per cent. By doing these things you will be able to get back the large, tart sweet prune, which can be sold in any market."

County Agent Cooney talked to the farmers, giving his viewpoint on the
