Full class, while any pupil becoming six years of age prior to March 1st may enter the second semester, beginning class, providing there is room for the latter pupils.

B class pupils living west of the railroad tracks shall attend school at the Fullerton building. A class pupils shall attend the Rose school. Pupils in all grades who live on the south side of Washington St. and south of this street and east of the railroad tracks shall attend school at the Rose building. Pupils living on the north side of Washington St. and north from this street and east of the railroad tracks shall attend school at the Benson building. Pupils on or near these boundary limits may be transferred from one school to another if any grade becomes congested.

Each pupil shall be furnished by his parents with books and other materials needed in the grade to which he belongs. A pupil should consult his teacher before purchasing supplies.

The list of the proper text books to be obtained is on file at the Roseburg Book Store or this information may be obtained at the nearest school or the superintendent's office.

SA pupils as well as the TB pupils will purchase the American History text by Macco. Those students electing high school physics will use the revised text.

A check up of the enrollment of last year and the school census point to a record number of pupils to be accommodated the coming term. Incoming teachers must be provided with living accommodations. Anyone desiring to room or board a teacher should write or phone Superintendent M. S. Hamm. He will be glad also to receive the name of any persons wanting the services of high-school boys or girls.

CITY SCHOOLS TO OPEN SEPT. 17

City Superintendent Gives Information on Registration and Requirements

ROOMS ARE NEEDED

School Officials Desire to Get in Touch with Persons Who Can Furnish Accommodations for Teachers

In order to aid students who are planning to attend the local high school and grade schools and also for the advisement of the parents, City Superintendent M. S. Hamm has prepared a large amount of data concerning the opening of schools which if carefully read and followed will eliminate all confusion and make the opening of schools orderly and effective. Particular attention is called to the fact that the city superintendent desires to get in touch with persons who have accommodations for teachers who will be employed here this year. He will also be glad to hear from anyone who can furnish work after school hours and on holidays for students who are endeavoring to earn their way through schools.

The information given by Mr. Hamm is as follows:

High School Registration.
To enable both old and new students in planning their first semester's work, the following data will be of value.

The subjects to be taught in each year are as follows:

Freshman.
*English I-II; Algebra I-II; Greek—Roman History; Sewing I. *Occupations; and for those who plan to take the complete Commercial course.

Penmanship and Spelling

Sophomore.
*English III-IV; Plane Geometry III; Censor; Physiology; Medieval & Modern History; Commercial Geography; Bookkeeping I; Cooking I.

Junior.
*English V-VI; Solid Geometry; *American History; Spanish I; Virgil; Biology; Bookkeeping III; Shorthand I; Typewriting I; and Cooking I or Sewing III.

Senior.
*English VII-VIII; *Civics; Spanish III; Virgil; Physics; Shorthand III; Typewriting III; and Sewing II.
Note:—Subjects starred are required of all students for graduation.

As usual the high school students will choose their studies before school opens. Seniors will register on Monday, September 10th; Juniors, Tuesday, September 11th; Sophomores, Wednesday, September 12th; and the Freshmen on Thursday or Friday, September 13-14. The hours are from 8:30 to 12:00 a. m. and from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. In some classes the number of students is limited. These classes will be filled in order of registration.

Entrance Requirements.

A graduate from the eighth grade of any city school or one who holds an Oregon eighth grade certificate or an equivalent diploma from any other state, may enter Roseburg High School. Students having taken high school work elsewhere will be given full credit for same if the school attended is standardized; otherwise examinations must be taken in all subjects where credit is desired. Students coming from districts where high schools are maintained shall pay each semester in advance a tuition fee equal to the per capita cost of the preceding school year.

Grade Schools.

Section 406 of the Oregon State School Code, provides that, every parent or guardian having control of any child or children between and including the ages of nine and fifteen years, shall be required to send such child or children to school during the time it is in session and for the failure of complying with this act on the part of any parent or guardian he shall be liable to a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00 or by imprisonment in jail not less than two nor more than ten days.

All persons of school age whose parents or guardians are registered voters in school district No. 4, Douglas county, Oregon are entitled to attend the public school free of charge, who live outside of District No. 4 may be admitted to the Roseburg grade schools upon the payment in advance of each semester's tuition, prior to September 17, 1923 and January 23, 1924, to the school clerk, at the rate of \$22.50 per semester.

Pupils permanently withdrawing from school for unavoidable causes shall have refunded to them the tuition which would have been necessary for the remainder of the semester or year.

New classes in the lowest grade of the primary department shall be formed at the Rose and Benson schools at the beginning of each semester. No pupil commencing the work of the first year shall enter school during any semester later than the second Friday. Any pupil becoming six years of age, prior to November 1, may enter the
