## THE DEVELOPMENT OF PURPOSE.

A young person's achievement in life depends largely on his purposes. What is he driving at? What are his life aims?

In many cases, the only aim you can discover is a vague desire for fun and amusement, to have a good time.

Now if there is any way for the schools to wake up such young people, to put into their heads a determination to win their way, their attainment will be tremendously increased. A boy who is interested in study will cover twice or three times as much ground, and know every point in each lesson better, than the mere in loving pupil who dislikes work. The arousing of ambition is one of the chief tasks of school life. The teacher must work every day to make success and accomplishment seem worth while.

In these times when our country is torn by faction and controversy, the children need to acquire certain habits of fair-mindedness. Every child needs to be taught that in seeking his own rights, he must never infringe on the rights of others. The teacher may have a better chance to teach fundamental ideals of justice in regulating the quarrels of the playground, than she could ever do in a formal talk on right conduct.

The world is always full of dishonesty and children need instruction in morals. They will fall to dreaming if a teacher sermonizes on the subject. But great moral truths can be put into fascinating story form, leading them to despise yellow conduct, and admire uprightness and straight living.

They need lessons of good citizenship. They need to discover that they are to be partners in the joint business of conducting civil government, and that they will suffer if they fail to cooperate with their fellow citizens. They need to get in the habit from an early age of taking a share in community projects. In such ways the merely selfish boy or girl can be helped to form the habit of team work and playing the game of life in a high minded way.

## INTERESTING THE PEOPLE

The problem before a business man or firm that wants to build up a good and growing trade, is as to how to interest the people in the goods offered by that enterprise. It is not a difficult problem, provided it is attacked from the right angle.

The people are deeply interested in any proposition that provides them with good goods at moderate prices, that offers special opportunities as the result of enterprise and desire for service. People feel the cost of living keenly, they are always looking for chances to save money. Any suggestion that seems to offer help along such lines meets with close attention.

When a business man places a notice in a newspaper offering desirable lines of goods, or merchandise believed to have special values, the public is at once very much interested. Such an announcement suggests the means by which the people can make their money go a good distance, and avoid some of the tax laid upon every family by the present high scale of prices.

A concern that makes such a public announcement need have no fear that it will not attract attention. People are more interested in it than in the ordinary news stories, because it appeals so intimately to their desires, and offers help in meeting the problems of home finance that harass them so persistently.

Even if advertisements are not written in a specially convincing or skillful way, they make a big appeal because they suggest that a concern is making a big effort to please. And if values and prices are stated so as to suggest that real bargains are being offered, the advertiser has made an appeal which is very attractive in these times. The people read such notices, and a lot of them respond by visiting the store and buying.
