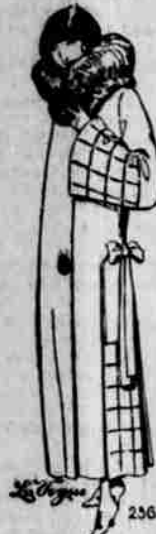

### IRVINE TO QUIT, IS RUMOR

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 5.—The latest rumor affecting the state house here, and one that is said also to be in circulation in Portland, is that Ward A. Irvine, private secretary to Governor Pierce, will present his resignation to the governor about October 1. Just how much foundation there is to the rumor is not known. Irvine's resignation has been predicted several times, and on one occasion he is said actually to have turned in his resignation because of dissatisfaction with one of the governor's appointments, but decided upon reconsideration not to quit the service of the executive office.

## DIAMOND LAKE VERY POPULAR

Attendance at Douglas County Resort Growing Very Rapidly

NEW HOTEL IS OPENED

Dance Features Opening of Lodge on Saturday Night—Tent Houses Erected to Accommodate Tourists

With an attendance far exceeding that of last year, Diamond lake, another of Douglas county's famed resorts, this year is coming into its own.

The Diamond Lake Improvement company, owner of the resort at the lake, reports that the attendance last year of 4,000 was equalled September 1 of this year, with another month before the season closes. The company formally opened the lodge Saturday with a dance, music being furnished by the Diamond orchestra. The new building, constructed entirely of logs, contains an excellent dance floor and a commodious dining room. A large stone fireplace lends a homelike atmosphere to the rooms.

Nine tent houses have been erected and several tents without floors serve to absorb the overflow. Sunday night 75 people were accommodated, and in addition many were camped along the lake shore. A grocery and general supply store, barber shop and gasoline station are maintained.

The lake is seven miles long and affords good fishing, boating and swimming. While the rainbow trout for which the lake is famed were not taking the hook this week end, campers there report large catches a few days before and predict that good fishing will be had again before the season closes. Rowboats and launches are furnished by the resort company.

Erection of a bathing house on the beach started Monday. Bathing suits are furnished, and the growing popularity of bathing has made necessary a building equipped with shower baths and dressing rooms.

The road follows the lake shore three miles, ending at the lodge. The forest service is planning a road entirely around the lake, giving access to the west side where summer home sites are being offered for lease by the forest service. The growing popularity of the lake is shown by the fact that several of the sites have already been spoken for.

Persons going to the lake will find it well worth while to go by way of Crater lake lodge and the west side rim road. The distance to Diamond lake from Crater lake lodge is 22 miles. Except for a few miles after the road leaves the rim, where roots have not yet been grubbed out, the entire road is good.

**OVERLAND WILLYS-KNIGHT HUPMOBILE**

is to sail tomorrow for Yokohama, if proper arrangements can be made by the Coos Bay Pirates, who are starting Japanese relief operations here, according to M. S. Taylor of the organization. A conference this afternoon with A. W. Kinney, in charge of the cargo taken by the vessel was to decide on the details of the undertaking.

The decision to send potatoes was reached yesterday during one of the Pirate gatherings. Potatoes would keep and were better adapted for the open cargo facilities of the vessel than any other food supply, it was thought.

The Pirate solicitors are also ask-

ing for monetary contributions with which to do more far reaching work than the vegetables will do.

"This is an opportunity to do something worth while for good customers of Coos Bay," Mr. Taylor said. "They have purchased a vast amount of our exports and it is up to us to help them when they are in trouble."

"Yokohama and Tokio must be rebuilt and a little help from us now may be appreciated and may be returned to us with interest."
