SALEM, Ore., Sept. 5.—Adjutant General George A. White today accepted the resignation of Major J. Francis Drake, of Portland, as an officer of the Oregon national guard and also announced that a few days ago Major Drake was dismissed as an officer of the general staff. White declined to discuss the resignation further. He said that Drake has no war service to his credit. Lieutenant Colonel Eugene Mosberger, of Woodburn, has been put on the general staff in Drake's place. Drake's successor as a battalion commander will be nominated by the colonels of the two Oregon regiments.

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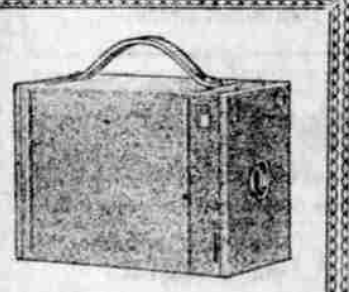
