TOMMY GIBBONS
IN CLEVER BILL

Vaudeville Offering at Antlers
Theater Last Night Delights
the Large Crowd

ALL ACTS WERE GOOD

Juggling, Dancing, Music,
Tumbling and Dialogue
in Addition to Boxing
Exhibition

A capacity audience at the Antlers theatre last night was delighted with the five-act Pantages vaudeville bill featuring Tommy Gibbons the world's most popular heavyweight boxer. This vaudeville bill was one of the best to be seen in this city for many years. Instead of having one feature number and several acts of mediocre quality, every offering last night was pleasing and delightful and the audience was exceptionally well pleased.

Following an interesting educational and Larry Semon film comedy, the Pantages bill was opened by Wilford Dubois, a juggler, whose clever tricks with a tennis racket and balls kept the crowd on the edge of their seats. He introduced many new novelties in his act which won ringing applause from the delighted spectators.

Webber and Elliott in "Nonsensical Nonsense" put over some clever comedy. Elliott came out to sing and was interrupted by a boob hunting a seat in the audience. The boob finally got onto the stage and their work together was intensely humorous. They were good singers and introduced some fine music with their lines.

El Cota, xylophonist, had a very superior act. Mixed with some comedy he presented musical numbers of great excellence, his presentation of "The Rosary" and the Prelude in C Sharp minor by Rachmanninoff, were highly pleasing and the crowd was loath to have him depart from the stage.

The Wrights sponsored a brilliant dance revue, called "The Spectacular Septette," in which seven young maids exhibited a few dancing steps and much anatomy. All were gifted in dancing ability and their chorus dancing was very good. Their solo dancing was also above the average.

The Gillis boys, two grownups and a diminutive brother, have a capital act. They are all excellent gymnasts and athletes and their rapidly moving act was filled with amusing adventures and splendid physical maneuvers.

Tommy Gibbons the headliner was given a fine hand upon his appearance. He was introduced by one of the Gillis boys as his manager has returned to New York to endeavor to secure a return match with Dempsey for the championship. Gibbons demonstrated some of the exercises used in training and then went through an exhibition match with his sparring partner. Some of the most effective punches were explained in slow motion, and then in quick action. They then boxed three short snappy rounds, Gibbons exhibiting some of his speed and agility in dodging the blows of his sparring partner.

Altogether the offering was one of much merit and everyone was well pleased.

PRUNE GROWERS TO
MEET TOMORROW

Prune growers will meet in Roseburg tomorrow to perfect the Umpqua Valley Prune Growers' association, an independent organization which will probably affiliate with the Northwestern Growers' association in the state marketing program. G. F. Cadish of the bureau of economics, of Washington, D. C., will be present and also C. J. Hurd, head of the state department of markets of the Oregon Agricultural college. The committee appointed to draw up by-laws and regulations for the organization is completing its work today and will have a tentative proposition to submit for consideration at tomorrow's meeting.

CIVIL WAR VETS
HOLD ELECTION

ASHLAND, Ore., Sept. 6.—Officers for the coming year were elected by the Civil War Veterans Association of Southern Oregon, who are holding their annual encampment here this week. J. O. Vannatta of Ashland, colonel commander; William Lyman

of Medford, lieutenant colonel; V. S. Grout of Roseburg, major; Lela Howard of Ashland, chaplain; Bertha Arms of Gold Hill, adjutant, are the new officers. George Noble of Ashland is the quartermaster for the coming year.

At the business meeting this morning of the Old Soldiers and Sailors Association of Southern Oregon it was unanimously voted to have the annual convention at Ashland again next year, as the Civil War veterans who make up the organization believe that the park here furnishes an ideal place to hold the meeting.

There are about 200 members registered at the camp in the park.

Special efforts were made by the park ranger force to destroy predatory animals, such as the mountain lion, coyote and wolf, with the result that 221 coyotes and 8 wolves were accounted for up to last May.
