PRUNE MEN TO MEET HERE SOON

(Continued from page one.)

This year, however, conditions are much better. The crop, although not as heavy in tonnage, runs to much the price is based upon the size of the fruit the money received by the growers will be perhaps more than last season.

This, of course, depends upon market conditions. At the present time the market appears to be picking up and is growing stronger each day. Although very little buying is going on at the present time, and it may be several weeks before any active purchasing is started, it is believed that eventually the growers will obtain a good price. This price possibly will be around 6 and 7 cents for 40-45s with a quarter drop on smaller sizes.

Sizes above 40-45, of course, will bring a still better price as they are at a premium and buyers are willing to pay more for them as they can be disposed of much more readily than the smaller fruit.

Brokers are very cautious in their buying. They were caught in the price drop two years ago and as a result are handling the prune situation with care. Packers, naturally, are slow about buying as they have no assurance from their brokers that the packed product can be disposed of. All of this reflects back to the grower, who must hold his crop until the market stabilizes itself.

The prune market it is believed is undergoing a return to normalcy. At present there are many marketing schemes in the air and there seems to be general disorganization, but it is thought that this condition will right itself. The growers are working through cooperative associations to create a greater demand, which doubtless will have much effect. An uncertain factor is the proposed pool by the California Packing corporation, which may result in many growers taking up that scheme. The Northwest Cooperative Prune exchange is going to have considerable effect upon the market, and altogether a rather uncertain state of affairs exists.

The consuming public, however, demands a certain amount of prunes. This demand creates a market which must be supplied in some form or other. The demand is increasing, and experts state that it will not be long until the surplus is exhausted and demands will be made on the coming crop. When this condition occurs the brokers and packers will be in a better position to make definite figures and the market will be believed that the grower will

receive a fair return and that in the future the prune industry will be on a better basis through the experience gained in the times now believed to be passing.

Those closely in touch with the situation feel encouraged over the outlook, and although this year's crop will not bring great profits, yet gradually become better.

PUPILS TRY STILL DEPICTED IN BOOK

School Superintendent Has It Banned From Curriculum After Anti-Saloon League Makes Drive

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Sept. 13.—Claiming that a school book known as "Health Lessons, Book Two," by Alvin Davidson, contains a drawing showing "a simple still for distillation of whiskey," accompanied by a description of the process of distillation, and that the superintendent of a county school has caught some of his boys under the school house using this book as a guide in the construction of a still, J. Bibbs Mills, superintendent of the anti-saloon league of Alabama, made a drive for abolition of this book from Alabama schools.

Mills, together with Dr. W. B. Crumpton, appeared before the state board of education protesting the use of the book, stating that its evil influences are far-reaching. The board, according to the state anti-saloon league chief, has agreed to abandon it in Alabama schools.

ITALO-JUGOSLAV WAR IS POSSIBLE

Europe Is Anxiously Awaiting Belgrade's Reply to Italy's Demands

FRANCE IS AFFECTED

Placed in Delicate Position as Result of Her Attitude Towards Little Entente and Italy

(By United Press.)
LONDON, Sept. 13.—The possibility of an Italo-Jugo Slav war within 72 hours is agitating the chancelleries of Europe while they awaited anxiously for the terms of Belgrade's reply to the ultimatum of Premier Mussolini, demanding the acceptance of the Italian thesis for the settlement of the Fiume controversy by Saturday.

Great Britain for the moment is not directly concerned in the dispute. There is little likelihood that she will be personally involved, although the statesmen realize the dangers of the new general European conflagration. France is in the most delicate position of the outside powers since she has closed ties with both the Little Entente and Italy. She is sure to create bitter resentment whichever side she supports. It is equally impossible for Premier Poincare to remain neutral.
