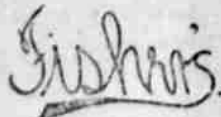

**GLENDALE GIRL
DIES SUDDENLY**

Word was received here early this morning that Miss Gertrude Smith of Glendale, who was injured in an automobile accident near the Booth ranch a few days ago, died suddenly at her home this morning. The father called Dr. Seeley at 4 o'clock this morning and asked him to come to Glendale, but while he was talking the girl died. It was stated that her breathing became difficult and that a physician was called there and that as he was injecting a stimulant she died very suddenly. No cause could be given, as she appeared to be greatly improved when she left Roseburg, and it was even thought that she would retain her eyesight. She was hurt a few days ago when the car driven by her mother and the machine driven by Charles Watson collided near the Booth ranch. The girl was badly cut about the face and head and it was feared that she would lose the sight of one eye.

**CLIP PASTOR WHO
ADDRESSED BLACKS**

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 18.—To have one's hair and beard closely cropped with an ugly pair of scissors, wielded by three rough and angry white men, is a pretty high price for a white minister to pay for preaching to a negro congregation.

Yet this is the record exclusively claimed by George W. Messinger of this city, who says he has been an ordained minister for 45 years. The trio, the preacher is quoted as saying, visited him at noon one warm day recently, told him he had been preaching to negroes and that they were going to "point" him with a "little treatment," whereupon two of them seized him, forced him into a chair, and a third member of the party operated the scissors. The police record bears out the testimony of the minister.

Rev. Messinger is a missionary evangelist, and he admits having appeared before a negro congregation to discuss missionary work. He stated that he could identify his assailants and intended swearing out warrants for their arrest.
