SALEM, Sept. 24.—A demand for a "more equitable assessment law in this state having reference to the income bearing ability of the property," was voiced by Governor Pierce in opening the conference of county tax conservation commissioners here this morning.

The governor also stressed the need for new sources of revenue in this state to lighten the loan now borne by bonded property, calling attention to the income tax, severance tax, gross earnings tax and a tax upon natural resources as offering possible solutions to Oregon's present problem.

The conference which is attended by approximately 90 members of the state's 35 county tax conservation commissions, was organized by electing Seymour Jones of Salem, chairman and Roy Stockton of Malheur county, secretary.

Taxes have been mounting at such a terrific speed in county, state, city, school district and other taxing units that I have come to believe that drastic measures must be used," the governor declared in explaining his support of the measures which created the tax conservation commissions.

ROSEBURG GIRL WRITES OF QUAKE (Continued from Page One.) 1200 of 1400 refugees on board. Matresses were put down all over the ship. Several operations were performed on board yesterday. We may expect to leave most of these people at Kobe, and may not. They are foreigners for the most part—English, Swiss, French, German, etc. A number of Japanese women servants were brought along. People have been wonderful about giving clothing and helping in any way they can.

English Woman Injured. Mrs. James, the woman so badly bruised in our cabin, is quite well educated. She was born in Paris and has traveled a great deal. Mrs. Foster is from London and talks with a cockney accent. She is decidedly interested, but ignorant of America. Said a woman from America was here to buy stamps in Yokohama, but Japanese money. Mrs. Foster to mail her letters for her and change the American gas for that of our coin. "I was glad to see said Mrs. Foster, "but I don't know how much it was worth."

"Last night we watched the burning. For the most part it was on fire. With the hundreds of from the vessels in the harbor red fire glow, it was a horrible sight, although this sounds terrible, the misery it causes. "The garb the refugees donned as clothing was poor and surely are funny in some. Some wear a fancy dress, but the most terrible shoes. We're glad for anything to cover their feet. "Two of the wealthier men in Yokohama insisted on being the ship with their families. They accept help from us as they regard it all as a debt.
