LABOR SOUNDS ITS BATTLE CRY IN PORTLAND TODAY

MADE FOR INDUSTRIAL DEMOCRACY IS PROCLAIMED AT CONVENTION OPENING TODAY

Executive Committee of American Federation of Labor Submits Annual Report Today — Would Have Farmers Organize Their Own Trade Unions

MAIN POINTS IN AMERICAN FEDERATION OF LABOR EXECUTIVE COUNCIL REPORT

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—Following is a summary of the salient features of the executive committee of the American Federation of Labor submitted to the annual convention now in session here:

The committee reports the successful "resisting employers in five years" war to the labor organizations.

The committee reports the "state invasion of industrial life," citing the Sherman law, the Esch-Cummings act, the Kansas state industrial court law, the Colorado industrial law as examples.

The committee reports an "industrial franchise for workers," similar to the existing franchise.

The committee reports the American farmers to organize trade unions.

The committee reports the congress be empowered to re-enact by two-thirds vote any law unconstitutional by the United States supreme court.

The committee reports the 1924 convention until November 17, 1924, because of the campaign during summer.

The committee reports the communist propaganda in interests of an "amalgamation of workers."

The committee reports the restriction of immigration.

The committee reports the Volstead act as a "social and moral failure which attempts to do all laws," but upholds the eighteenth amendment.

The committee reports the enactment of light wines and beer amendment.

The committee reports the laying down platform for "favorable candidates" for light for direct primaries.

The committee reports the Ku Klux Klan as "un-American" and urges members to leave.

The committee reports the organization of Fascist movement in United States.

The committee reports the repeal of Esch-Cummings act and Sherman anti-trust law.

The committee reports the new campaign for enactment of child-labor and women's wage laws.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 1.—(United Press.)—A call to "all who have been" to join the American Federation of Labor in "a great crusade for industrial democracy" was today by the federation's executive committee in submitting its report to the annual convention here.

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OFFICIALS MAKE TALKS

PORTLAND, Oct. 1.—Vigorous denunciation of child labor and the reds and radicalism characterized the annual address of President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor. Mayor Baker in his welcoming address to the convention referred to the Federation as the "safety valve of American labor." The convention applauded his declaration that there was "no room for the I. W. W., Bolshevism or any other isms." Governor Pierce was applauded when he said "Oregon is opposed to a Mongolian invasion." He said, "Against those who cannot be assimilated we should shut our doors tight."

LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 1.—The navy dirigible ZR-1 left early today on a non-stop flight to St. Louis with Commander Frank R. McCrary and a crew of 42 officers and men. If the weather conditions remain favorable the ship is expected to arrive in St. Louis early Tuesday morning.

LOCAL MAN HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Tom Jenny received painful injuries yesterday afternoon when he was struck by a Crater Lake bus while making repairs to his car at a point on the highway just south of the city limits. A tire on Mr. Jenny's car blew out, and he stopped alongside the highway, with part of the car on the pavement, to ascertain the amount of damage done. While he was working around the machine, a Crater Lake bus drove up from behind and tried to pass. At the same time a car driven by Mr. Summerhalter of this city, traveling in the opposite direction, also reached the spot, and the three cars were unable to pass. The bus ripped a fender from Mr. Summerhalter's machine, and caught Mr. Jenny between the right side of the bus and his own car, cutting his leg and mashing his arm.

CANNERY STOCK IS SUBSCRIBED

Appeal for Financial Aid for Umpqua Cannery Meets With Ready Response

THIRD WEEK OF INQUIRY STARTED

FREIGHTER ON FIRE SAYS RADIO MESSAGE

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 1.—The fire in the No. 6 hold of the Freighter Diana Dollar is probably under control according to a radiogram picked up at San Pedro today. The Holland American Royal steam packet "Dredchik," previously reporting picking up an "SOS" from the Dollar and this ship is expected to render assistance within a few minutes. The endangered vessel is approximately 1200 miles south of here.

WYOMING SUFFERS FROM BAD FLOODS

CASPER, Wyo., Oct. 1.—Desolation grips the valley of Big Horn river for 75 miles between Thermopolis and Greybull, with the crops wiped out and the ranches flooded. No estimate of the damage is given.

PROPERTY LOSS HIGH.

SHERIDAN, Wyo., Oct. 1.—The property loss in this district is constantly mounting. Railway traffic in this part of the state is virtually at a standstill as a result of a cloudburst sweeping northern and western Wyoming during the past week. Twenty five miles of new railroad track between Laramie and Bonneville have been washed out. Roadbeds and highway bridges were undermined in other localities. No loss of life is reported.

GOVERNOR WALTON MAKING ATTEMPT TO HALT ELECTION HELD IN OKLAHOMA TOMORROW

Has Mobilized An Army of 100,000 to Interfere With the Election Plans—Sheriff Declares Balloting Will Take Place Regardless of Attempted Blockade.

TULSA, Oct. 1.—Armed forces faced off at noon today at the Tulsa county courthouse as the hour approached for the distribution of election supplies to the precinct polling places for tomorrow's special election.

R. R. Stevens, Governor Walton's intelligence officer, in charge of twelve "armed citizen volunteers" said that any ballots or supplies received from the building will be "taken out over our dead bodies."

It was announced that preparation to open the supply vault will not be completed before two o'clock.

At one o'clock Sheriff Sanford, backed by two hundred armed special deputies surrounded the twelve "citizen volunteers" and ordered them from the building. They left in a body.

Sheriff Sanford said he had commissioned more than a thousand special deputies to insure the election and had ordered the arrest of all persons carrying arms without lawful permit.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 1.—(A. P.) Playing his trump card, Governor Walton today reconstituted the state election board and orders issued by the new board went out at once by telegraph to all the county boards to halt the special state election for tomorrow.

TULSA, Oct. 1.—An injunction directed against the entire national guard of the state and all officers operating under the authority of the special state police commissions, restraining them from interfering with the election tomorrow was issued here today by District Judge Hunt.

Several hundred men have been sworn in by Sheriff Bob Sanford, who has declared the court's order will be enforced and every man thrown in jail who attempts to hinder the opening of the polls. The sheriff declared "there will be twenty armed deputies sworn in to permit the election to take place."

GERMAN RIOTS NOT YET ENDED

(By Associated Press.)
LONDON, Oct. 1.—The revolutionary movement originated by the Nationalist organizations has broken out at Kuesstrin, 50 miles from Berlin, says a Reuter dispatch from the German capital. The insurgents attempted to disarm the garrison and occupy the fortress but the commander of the Reichswehr arrested the leaders and drove back the attackers.

CENSORSHIP IMPOSED.

BERLIN, Oct. 1.—Censorship has been imposed on all of the military news sent from Germany. A parliamentary crisis was predicted today.

ORDER RESTORED.

BERLIN, Oct. 1.—(U. P.)—Order was restored at Duesseeldorf early today where 30,000 separatists incited a riot Sunday, resulting in 16 deaths and wounding 50 to 100. The French troops were patrolling the city and they have arrested a number of Germans alleged to be responsible for the disorders.

RACIAL RIOTS ARE STARTED IN N. C.

RALEIGH, N. C., Oct. 1.—The Concord company of the national guard, specially trained for emergency service in the civilian-military clashes, arrived in Spruce Pine today to augment the militiamen called there by the smoldering race feeling. Additional soldiers were ordered when Governor Harrison was advised of sporadic shooting in Spruce Pine during the night.

WALTON HAS BIG ARMY.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 1.—(United Press.)—Governor Walton today claimed he had an army of 100,000, composed of the entire national guard of 4,000, now ordered mobilized, 75,000 volunteers and 22,000 special secret service men to prevent the state election on Tuesday.

Attorney General Short, Secretary of State McAllister and other officials joined in saying the election would be held. The ballots were ordered printed and the voters advised to "quietly and peaceably cast their ballots."

FORD CAR STOLEN AND BADLY WRECKED

A Ford car belonging to W. H. Gerretsen of this city was stolen Saturday night from in front of the owner's home. The machine was driven to a point near the Happy Valley bridge, where it was stripped of radiator, windshield, lights, cushions, tools, tires and all other parts which could be removed. The thieves apparently were old timers at the business and are taking parts which cannot be identified. Only the engine, running gear, and stripped body were left. The theft of the machine was reported Sunday morning, and the car was located today, but it will require a large sum to put it back into shape.

THREE BOYS WRECK COMSTOCK SCHOOL

Guy Wood, aged 15, of 265 East Fifth street, Carl Lutz, aged 15, of 2050 East Stark street, and Joe Lachance, aged 15, of 2013, East Delano street, all of Portland, were arrested here this morning charged with damaging the school house at Comstock. The boys are alleged to have entered the school building yesterday morning, and to have thrown the contents of more than a dozen tin bottles over the walls, doors, curtains and blackboards. The books were taken from the desks and thrown about the room, the pencils gathered up and destroyed, and the schoolroom generally wrecked. The damage is estimated at more than \$100. The boys rode to Roseburg with a tourist and were picked up by Chief of Police Ketch. Charles Lawrence and A. V. Willis, members of the schoolboard at Comstock, came to Roseburg today to take the case up with the district attorney to find out if damages can be recovered.

BELLOWS RADIO SHOP IS MOVED

The Bellows Radio Shop today moved its location from the Lindsey building to the building occupied by the Umpqua Cannery Station. The two business concerns will occupy joint quarters in the future.
