A PRETTY SPECTACLE.

The spectacle of a bunch of murderers, cut-throats and thieves parading about the state fair grounds during the recent exhibit at Salem was anything but elevating. The excuse of the penitentiary warden that these criminals had been let loose to spot on liquor vendors is an insult to the intelligence of the state. Of what value is the evidence of a convicted criminal, and further, what good cause could be elevated by such a gang of shysters aligning themselves with the prohibition enforcement laws? Things have come to a pretty pass when this great state is compelled to commandeer a set of prison inmates to enforce the law. What is our citizenship coming to?

And further, if the warden at the penitentiary is using the spotter stunt as a subterfuge to exonerate himself the good people of the state of Oregon who have stood for clean, effective law enforcement should demand that Governor Pierce take cognizance of this example of rank injustice.

The officers of this state are perfectly capable, or should be of coping with liquor vendors without the assistance of "dolled up" criminals parading about the community with the scalp of a human being swinging from their belt as the only excuse for their usefulness.

It is the general consensus of opinion that the farmers throughout the nation must wiggle out of their present difficulties. In other words, their individual needs and desires must be met and dissolved by their own initiative. If this is a fact, and there really seems no other course to take, it might be well to eliminate a lot of idle gossip about the farmer's condition and get down to some real constructive work in his behalf and throw all legislation to the winds.

The ordinary politician these days must be a trained athlete. To keep within the bounds of popular opinion is quite more essential—in the way of getting votes—than training in any one particular political arena. The voter is getting "wised up" to playing the game just about as profitably, and from as many angles, as the fellow seeking his support.

An independent press is a life-saver for the common people. No business can be successful when hobbled by side-line dictatorship. And of all business most likely to succumb to this sort of "nursing" is the newspaper. Better be independent than an indent.

It requires a big soul to take second place gracefully when he wants first place and thinks it is due him. And many a man has thwarted his life's ambition by refusing to do so. I am thinking of Daniel Webster, who yearned to be president of the United States, but rejected the vice-presidency. Yet, if he had accepted it, he would have been president in one month through the death of President Harrison.

On the other hand, many men have won the place they coveted by accepting second place. If Theodore Roosevelt had not been willing to accept the vice-presidency of the United States against his inclinations, he probably would never have been president.

Coming down to that mundane sphere in which most of us dwell, I knew a young technological expert who was competing for the position of city engineer. He was rejected and was offered the almost insulting sop of a clerkship in the office of his successful rival. He swallowed his pride and took it. In three months the city engineer resigned to accept a flattering offer elsewhere and our friend succeeded him. He would never have done so had he not accepted a humbler place first.

More often than otherwise we are not ready for first place when we think we are. We have an exaggerated sense of ego with which the rest of the world and perhaps the unseen powers may not agree. Probably no man was ever elected to a high position but what fifty per cent of the people in the same organization felt themselves better qualified to fill it than he.

If we cannot get first place, we had better accept second place, and be glad that we are even in sight of first place. When the time is right for us and we are right for the time, we shall be given first place.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—(United Press)—In winning his third straight American League pennant with the New York Yankees, Huggins, the little manager of the team, accomplished something that should rate for him a place among the real managerial leaders of baseball. Huggins never has been able to get the credit that he deserved for meritorious performances in the past, largely because he did not seek glory or the spotlight, and even now, when any other manager would be acclaimed for taking three pennants in succession, the little Yank boss is still being panned.

New York never has taken to Huggins and the comment is still being heard that anyone ought to win a team of pennants with a million dollar team and that the Yankees' pennant again this year, not because of Huggins' lack of the spectacular color of McCarraw, he is not a mixer like Uncle Wilbert Robinson, he is not as picturesque as Kid Gleason and he lacks the outward glories of leadership that are embodied in Frank Chance. The Yankee manager has shown no great ability as a developer of young players since he took the New York club, although he has had a part in making Ward and Meusel. But in his position no other manager would care to saddle himself with the responsibilities and gamble with young players. Developing youngsters is a big problem. Connie Mack has failed at it for seven years, and Mack has a great reputation for bringing along young players.

When Huggins was given the Yanks he was commissioned to get a winner and something to compete against the Giants as an attraction. Had Huggins been the greatest miracle man in the world in developing young players, he could not have gotten together a pennant winning team in the short space of time demanded by his employers.

He found himself in a fortunate position where the owners were willing and able to buy the players that Huggins decided would work well with his combination.

Huggins, at least did show some real good judgment in buying players. No other great stars that Huggins let go can be found on other teams like the castoffs of the Giants in the National League. The players that Huggins disposed of never caused him a regret while those he acquired delivered for him better than they were expected to do.

The smartest move made by Huggins was his recommendation for the purchase of Babe Ruth. The great Swat King proved a very profitable investment for the club owners after they were accused of being crazy by rival club owners for paying such a huge sum of money for the Babe.

The craftiness of the little manager was also shown last winter when he secured Herb Pennock from the Boston Red Sox. His critics said he was foolish to dispose of young Murray, a promising pitcher; McMillan, a young infielder, and other players in the deal, but those players failed to make good with the Red Sox, and Pennock, who had been regarded as through, turned out in his new uniform to be one of the best pitchers in the league.
