NOTICE OF SPECIAL CITY ELECTION

Notice is hereby given, that on the 14th day of September, 1923, there was filed in the office of the undersigned an initiative petition requesting that a special election be held in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, on November 5th, 1923, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said City the following proposed amendment to the existing municipal Charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, to-wit: An act to amend Section 33 of the existing municipal Charter of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, by adding thereto Subdivision 56, to authorize the City of Roseburg to acquire certain fire-fighting equipment, hereinafter described, providing for the issuance of not to exceed Fifteen Thousand Dollars in negotiable bonds of the City of Roseburg, to provide funds for the acquisition of said equipment, and providing for the levy of taxes to pay the interest on said bonds and to pay said bonds at maturity.

of Roseburg," approved October 19, 1880; and "An Act to amend an act entitled an act to incorporate the City of Roseburg," approved February 23, 1889; also, an act amendatory of said act, filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 19, 1891; and also an act to incorporate the City of Roseburg and to define the powers thereof, approved February 25, 1895; and to repeal all acts amendatory thereof and in conflict therewith," (which act was filed in the office of the Secretary of State on February 22, 1905), and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held May 6, 1907, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at the general election held therein on the 8th day of October, 1914, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held therein on the 3rd day of June, 1915, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held therein on the 22nd day of May, 1916, and as amended by vote of the people of said City at an election held therein on the 21st day of May, 1920, shall be and the same is amended hereby so as to read as follows, to-wit: Section 140. The Council may thereupon, by resolution, provide for the submission of the question of annexation of such territory or any part thereof to the qualified voters residing in the territory so designated at a special election called by the Council. Notice of the time and purpose of such special election and the voting place or places shall be given by publication in a newspaper of general circulation within the City of Roseburg for a period of twenty (20) days prior to such election and in addition, like notice shall be posted in four public places within the territory proposed to be annexed for a like period. The resolution calling such special election shall direct the giving of such notice, and said notice as published and posted shall be signed by the City Recorder. Such notice shall also distinctly state the proposition to be submitted, the boundaries of the territory proposed to be annexed and the legal voters within said territory shall be invited to vote on such proposition by placing upon their ballot the words "For Annexation" or the words "Against Annexation," or words equivalent thereto. The Council shall also designate the time and places at which the polls will be opened within such territory, which places shall, as far as practicable, be the place or places usually used for voting purposes within such territory, if any such there be, and shall also appoint and designate the names of the judges and clerks of election, all of which may be done in the resolution calling the special election and stated in the notice to be published and posted as herein provided. The votes cast shall be counted, canvassed and returned in the same manner as if such votes had been cast upon such proposition at a general election, except that such returns shall be made to the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon. It shall be the duty of the City Recorder to provide a sufficient number of suitable ballots to be used at such election. The expenses of any such special election shall be paid out of the general funds of the City of Roseburg, and the judges and clerks of election shall be entitled to receive the same compensation as judges and clerks serving at such general election. It shall be the duty of the judges at such election to allow each voter, residing within such territory to be annexed, and none other, to vote on such question of annexation; and any person, entitled by the laws of the State to vote for the office of County Clerk shall be entitled to vote at such special election if he resides within the limits of such territory so proposed to be annexed. The form in which said proposed Amendment shall appear on the official ballots of said election shall be as follows, to-wit: "Shall the amendment of Section 140 of the Charter of the City of Roseburg to authorize the Council of the City of Roseburg to call a special election in territory proposed to be annexed to the City of Roseburg as proposed by Ordinance No. 789 be adopted. Vote "Yes" or "No." Notice is therefore hereby given that pursuant to said petition and to said Ordinance No. 789, there is hereby called and will be held in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, on Tuesday, the 6th day of November, 1923, a special City election for the purpose of submitting said proposed Charter Amendments to the legal voters of said City for their approval or rejection. The voting places in the respective voting precincts and the judges and clerks of election therein, for holding said election, in said City, are the places and the judges and clerks thereof which will be designated by the County Court of Douglas County, Oregon, as the voting places and the judges and clerks thereof for holding the special State election to be held in said City on said date. That said election will commence and close on said 6th day of November, 1923, at the time provided by the laws of the State of Oregon. Dated at Roseburg, Oregon, this 3rd day of October, 1923. R. L.
