"LANE OF ALLIES" TO BE A GAY ROW

(By United Press.)
SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10.—"The
Lane of the Allies" will be the
brightest, gayest and most dazzling
street San Francisco has ever known
and will be prepared for the opening
of the American Legion national
convention here October 15, lasting
until October 19, when more than
100,000 men are expected to attend.

"The Path of Glory" which was
the name given Market street when
the men returned from the world
war will be the "Lane of the Allies"
this time with decorations promising
to outstrip those of 1919.

Market street from the Ferry
building to the Exposition auditorium
is the lane of glory. Contrasting
to the brilliance of the well be-
come black and white decorations
that mark the dedication of a mem-
orial in Lincoln Park to the fallen
soldiers who "went west." To the
measured beat of a military band's
drum, uniformed men will pay hom-
age to the glorious dead.

Consular officials, high army offi-
cers from other lands, as well as
from this country, church and civic
officials and others will take part in
the convention. The National Auxil-
iary of the Legion is holding its con-
vention here with the men, and the
women promise to have an equally
busy time at their business sessions.

SWEDISH DIPLOMAT ACCUSED OF SPYING DENIES HIS GUILT

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 10.—(A. P.)—

Folke Cronholm, Swedish charge d'affaires in Mexico City in 1917, who is credited with having acted in the interests of Germany in the passage of important notes in the early part of the war, has given out a statement in which he denies his guilt. He declares he did not play the spy for Germany during the war, but that in delivering cablegrams in code to the German legation in Mexico he was acting upon the instructions of his superior, K. A. Wallenberg, then Swedish minister of foreign affairs.

Mr. Cronholm's statement says in part: "Upon my return home I learned of the false rumor that I, as Swedish charge d'affaires in Mexico, was guilty of acting as a spy for Germany during the war, and that as a result I was recalled from my post."

"Referring to this latter allegation, which is ridiculous and false, I have already declared publicly that my alleged relations with the German government had nothing to do with my recall."

"As to the charge that in Mexico I acted as a German spy, I declare that the only cause for these rumors and accusations is to be found in that I, as later did also my successor, in obedience to orders from my superior, K. A. Wallenberg, then Swedish minister for foreign affairs, delivered a number of cablegrams received from him and written in a secret code of which I had no knowledge. Responsibility in this case, which led to such disastrous consequences for Sweden, rests upon Mr. Wallenberg and not upon me, his agent."

"My purpose today, on my return home, is to free myself of these suspicions. I stand accused of having acted as a German spy during the war while chief of the Swedish legation in Mexico City and during my confinement in Mexico I had no chance to rehabilitate myself."

"Such were my relations to the German legation in Mexico during the war. My notes in the archives of the Swedish legation in Mexico City record the receipt of these cablegrams from Mr. Wallenberg."

"My recall as Swedish charge d'affaires at Mexico City was not the result of complaints made by the Swedish residents of Mexico. Such complaints, even if justified, do not entail the sudden recall of a chief of legation without his knowledge. The Swedes in Mexico made no complaints of me because there were none to be made. The foreign minister has told me no complaints were made."

"Nor did my recall result from any kind of pressure on the part of the American government owing to any relations with the German government. I never have had relations with any government other than the Swedish government. Nor did I transmit to President Carranza any notes other than those I handed him in the name of my own government, officially or by special order."

"My recall from Mexico was an act of revenge on the part of the then foreign minister, Mr. Wallenberg, because a report made by me and other diplomats several years ago resulted in his brother, G. O. Wallenberg, then Swedish minister to Japan, being publicly reprimanded by his government."

The state department at Washington, on September 13, 1917, gave out the translation of an alleged letter from Heinrich von Eckhardt, then German minister at Mexico City, to Chancellor von Bethmann Hollweg, saying that Cronholm, in Mexico City, had entered into close relations with the German legation; that he was the only diplomat through whom information of "hostile camps" could be obtained; that he acted as an intermediary for official diplomatic intercourse between the German legation and the chancellor, and recommending that he be given a German decoration.

Von Eckhardt immediately denied from Mexico City that he had ever sent communications through Cronholm, or recommended him for a decoration, and on September 26, Cronholm, in the same city, denied von Eckhardt had offered him a decoration, or that he had ever furnished von Eckhardt information gathered among the enemies of his country in Mexico.

Dispatches from Stockholm last October said Cronholm had returned to the Swedish capital from Mexico and was engaged in preparing a defense of his alleged actions in Mexico.

NEW POSTMASTER SELECTED

MARSHFIELD, Oct. 9.—Duncan Douglas, acting postmaster of Marshfield, will receive his appointment for the new fall term within a few days according to Congressman W. C. Hawley who was here this morning. Mr. Hawley said he thought the commission had been forwarded and when he found it had not arrived, he wired Thursday night to the postoffice department. A. K. Peck and James Watson and their following had made a strenuous endeavor to secure the appointment of Mr. Watson as postmaster in Marshfield. Mr. Hawley said that Mr. Douglas had demonstrated his fitness for the position and that the great majority of people favored his selection.

BUGGY CAUSES WRECK

Unlighted Horse-Drawn Rig Causes Auto to Turn Turtle—Driver of Buggy Is Fined

The law requires that horse-drawn vehicles display two lights, one on each side.

In the event it is found that he did not steal the motorcycle he will probably be turned over to the Marine corps officers.

FARMERS SIGN NEW CONTRACT ON WHEAT

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 10.—Farmers in nearly fifteen states in which the American Wheat Growers Association operates have shown enthusiasm over the new contract which becomes effective when two-thirds of the crop is signed up, according to George C. Jewett, manager.

Washington is the one state in which the drive has not yet gone over big, he said. "We did all we could to aid the farmer because we thought him in a precarious position when he mortgaged his wheat," he declared. As a result, many of the farmers took advantage of the association and caused untold trouble by contracting their wheat and then mortgaging it."

It was stated that the new contract will clarify the sections relating to mortgaged wheat, such wheat to be sold through the association on the open market where the market is in the best condition to absorb it.

TO START WORK ON BUDGETS OCT. 22

County Tax Supervising Commission Will Begin Its Sessions on Monday the 22nd, It Is Announced Today

The Tax Supervising commission will meet on Monday, October 22, at 10 a. m., for the purpose of passing on the budgets which have been filed. It was announced today. Mr. Garrison is forced to be away for a few days and consequently the commission cannot get started on its task until the 22nd.

Budgets have been received from the county, nearly all of the municipalities, and about two-thirds of the school districts. The law provides a penalty of \$50 per day for every day of failure to file the budget after the first of October, but the commission is not exacting a penalty as yet. Notices are being sent out to the delinquent school districts, and time will be given them in which to file their budget of expenditures before any penalties are exacted.

The budgets already filed are being copied so that each member of the commission may have one for his examination. Immediately after the 22nd the commission will get together and go over the various estimates and adopt budgets in such form as may be decided upon. An opportunity will probably be afforded for those who desire changes made to express themselves before final action is taken by the commission.

NATIONAL "FORGET-ME-NOT" DAY WILL YIELD FUNDS TO AID VETERANS OF WAR

(International News Service.) CINCINNATI, Oct. 10.—America's wounded and disabled veterans of the World War will be benefited a hundredfold by the coming "National Forget-Me-Not Day," of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War, to be observed throughout the United States Saturday, November 10, according to National Commander James A. McFarland, of Dalton, Ga., national head of the disabled veterans' organization.

Commander McFarland is here to start preparations for "Forget-Me-Not Day," which is the annual "day" of the disabled American veterans, assisted by committees of citizens and women in various cities and towns, and sponsored by national, state and civic officials. The National Information Bureau, recognized authority on the merits or demerits of movements of this type, has heartily endorsed "Forget-Me-Not Day," and pointed out that the Disabled American Veterans' organization is solely interested in the relief, welfare, legislative, educational and organizational plans of the nation's wounded and disabled World War veterans.

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
