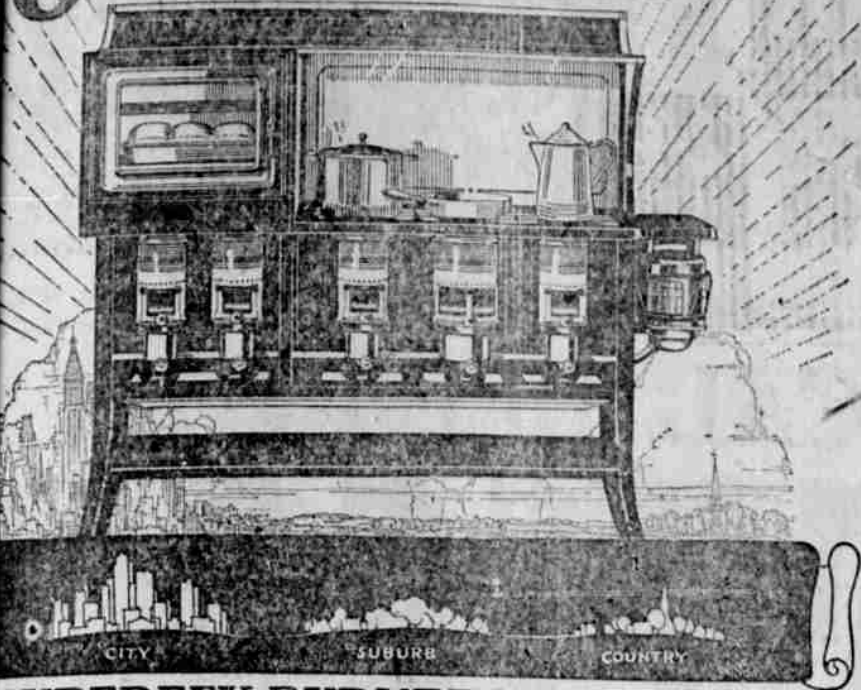

LAW IS UPHELD BY SUPREME COURT

Measure Passed by Legislature in 1917 Found Valid in Decision

AFFIRMS LOWER COURT

Instructions Given by Judge Hamilton in Case of State Against H. L. Newman Correct, Court Says

The first decision of the Oregon State Supreme Court in interpretation of the Oregon bastardy law, which was taken into the court on appeal from this county, has been received here, the court upholding the decision of Judge Hamilton and the contentions of Attorneys Neuner and Long, who appeared for the state. The case in which the law was tried out was that of the State of Oregon against H. L. Newman, who was charged with being the father of the illegitimate child of Ruth Wilkinson, a minor girl. The law under which the case was tried was passed by the legislature in 1917, but lay dormant for several years; that is, it was not enforced until the case against Mr. Newman was instituted in the circuit court of Douglas county.

The case was tried before a jury and resulted in a conviction and the defendant appealed from the findings of the circuit court, the case being taken to the supreme court.

Judge Hamilton, who presided, instructed the jury that the case was a civil proceeding and that the criminal rules of evidence were not applicable and that only nine members of the jury need concur in the verdict and that the issues of the case should be established on the preponderance of evidence, the state not being required to prove its allegations beyond a reasonable doubt as in a criminal case.

Judgment was entered declaring the defendant to be the father of the child and stipulating a sum to be paid monthly for the support of the child.

An appeal was taken by the defendant and the decision of that court has been rendered, supporting the law. The opinion written by Justice Bean sums up the case as follows:

The major object of the law is to provide for the maintenance of such a child by its putative father, and incidentally to relieve the state from the necessity of caring for such an offspring. The statute does not provide for the imposition of a penalty for an immoral or unlawful act. To say the least if the doctrine of reasonable doubt should be applied upon the trial of such a proceeding, the object of the law, as written at large in the act, would be rendered difficult and doubtful, and the attainment of justice in many cases would be endangered. The law, as expressed by the act, moderates the summary features of some of the older statutes. All of its provisions taken together are also consonant with the theory of a civil proceeding.

It necessarily follows that if the proceeding is civil in its nature, the court was well within the law in instructing the jury that nine of its number might concur in finding a verdict.

The charge to the jury by the learned trial judge was plain and explicit in conformity to the law. The judgment of the circuit court was right and is affirmed.

CREDIT UNION IS READY TO OPERATE

The Douglas County Rural Credits Union is now ready to operate and is in a position to receive applications for loans and to loan money on farm property or chattels. Four or five loans have already been made, and the board of directors has announced that the union can now handle a number of small loans.

This union was organized by farmers to help farmers and is the first of its kind in the state. A large amount of stock has been sold, and the money raised will be used to aid farmers throughout the county in making improvements. Farmers in need of funds to harvest crops, improve property, buy stock, fertilizer, seed, tile, or to do other work, or buy commodities which will improve and better his property, can secure money from this source.

Money will be loaned for short terms at the rate of interest to be 7 per cent on amortization loans and 5 per cent on straight loans. All loans are protected by first mortgages on live stock crops, real or personal property.

The credit board is arranging to meet every Saturday to go over applications and transact such business as may come before them. The directors and officers are all farmers or are some way engaged in agriculture.

ONCE RICH, SHE FEARS LOSS OF FERRYBOAT JOB

Daughter of London's Former Lord Mayor, 73 Years Old, Must Live on Pension

WAS REARED IN LUXURY

Educated in Select Fashionable School and Wedded an American—Spent Fortune While Young

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—In 1875 Florence Darby, daughter of the then Lord Mayor of London, danced in Buckingham Palace—the king her partner.

Today, at 73, she faces discharge, due to old age and inefficiency, from her position as matron on a Staten Island ferryboat.

A pension of \$24 a month—with her rent now twice that sum—must do in her old age. She spent a fortune of \$5,000 pounds, an inheritance from her grandfather, in her girlhood, she says.

Mrs. Florence M. Foye—she married James Foye in America while on a visit here—told her story to John H. Harman, park commissioner of Brooklyn, who ordered her dismissal from the city's service.

To "Manner Born."

"I was born in the wealthiest part of London, Southwest, between the palaces and parks," she said. "My father was Edward Darby, Lord Mayor of London. My mother was Elizabeth Franklin, a relative of Sir William Franklin, the court physician, knighted by William IV, and a descendant of Benjamin Franklin."

Mrs. Foye told of her girlhood.

She was educated in the select schools of London, Vienna and Paris, studying the fine arts, she said.

"Well do I remember the parties in the days of King Edward VII. The ferryboat matron told Commissioner Harman, 'Often I was invited to Buckingham Palace to the royal functions, where I danced with the King.'"

Had Large Fortune.

Her grandfather died in 1875, she said, leaving her \$187,000. The next year, she says she came to America to visit and here met the man she later married.

She had four children. Two girls

died. Her boys—one is a New York policeman, the other was convicted of a sensational diamond robbery in 1920, at the time he was secretary to Charles W. Gates, the millionaire—are her only living relatives, she says.

Mrs. Foye makes no explanation of how she spent her fortune.

"I suppose I am too old and not efficient enough to continue, and I accept my fate as just a part of the great game of life," she told Commissioner Harman.

LAW OBSERVANCE WEEK IS SET

Upon the request of the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union the week beginning Sunday, October 14th, will be designated as Law Observance and Law Enforcement week.

Ministers over the state have been requested to preach upon some aspect of law enforcement and it is stated that practically every minister of the state will devote a part or all of the sermon to this topic on the above date.

Mr. Horwig, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Oregon, speaking for all of the organizations, gives out the following interview:

"This call is issued in recognition of the tremendous propaganda which is being carried on to nullify prohibition and to discredit all law. It is a clarion call to those who believe in prohibition but who with the passage of the Eighteenth Amendment and the enactment of the Volstead law felt that the fight was over and lost active interest.

"Realizing that this inactivity and apathy has resulted in an apparent growth of liquor sentiment and in a non-observance of the enforcement act, not only by state officials and bootleggers but also by men and women who are law-abiding in every other way is the reason for Law Enforcement week, with the idea of recovering the morale of the moral and Christian forces upon the prohibition issue.

"The problem involved is the Constitution versus personal liberty or the mob versus law. It calls on moral and Christian forces and religious organizations to magnify the importance of good citizenship in the observance of all law but specially prohibition law. It is our conviction that the sentiment for law observance when mobilized in co-operation with federal, state and municipal officials can make the prohibition laws as effective as any others and as

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
