What God Says about - TRADITIONS

"Why do ye also transgress the commandment of God by your tradition?"

"Stand fast and hold the traditions which ye have been taught whether by word or our epistle."

Mine are good, yours are bad, says God. Yours annul the commandment; mine establish the Word.

Don't have any of your own. Hold fast to mine. Let's see what God means. When man mixes up his thoughts with God's plain word, there's a bad mess and no clear authority. When man by the aid of the Holy Spirit stands fast on God's own word, there is clearness of vision, simple directions for the daily walk, and, of course, all of the "All Power" (which was given to Christ upon His resurrection) which we need for the execution of His will. Now, if I say much more I shall spoil this distinction with something that may be traditional in man's sense.

Now as to the texts above quoted themselves. Jesus said the first and Paul the other, both with equal authority, because both spoke by the Spirit of God. Jesus spoke about tuning-down—nay, actually annulling—the commandment "Honor thy Father and Mother" by a man-made rule, that made it easy to get rid of the commandment; and there is a lot of that sort of thing going on in the church today.

Paul called for steadfastness to the revealed word of God from His mouth and from His epistles. And there is a great neglect of the word of God as it came by Paul in the church today.

STATE PRESS COMMENT

The Waste of Fruit

A trip through the valley shows a tremendous amount of fruit going to waste, particularly apples. A similar condition may be observed every year. One wonders if this waste could not, in part at least, be eliminated.

One of the growing industries in California is the fruit by-products industry. Take the raisin crop for example. Excellent syrup is being produced from the wastes incident to extraction of seeds. Pulp that used to be thrown away is now sold as pie filler. Fertilizer is made from the stems and other refuse. What is declared to be a highly palatable oil is made from the seeds. From seeds of the apricot a paste similar to almond paste is being manufactured and sold at a profit.

Similar utilization of the by-products of pears and apples may be impossible, but as far as we can determine, no proper investigation or research has been made.

There are the cider and vinegar and apple butter by-products, also the dried fruit departments, but there is reason to believe that the entire by-product phase of the fruit growing business has not been studied or developed in Oregon as it should be. In other lines of manufacture—and fruit raising is essentially manufacturing—profits are largely determined by the elimination of all waste. The pie that made Chicago famous, depended largely upon the skill with which his piebush was utilized, down to the squeal.

Perhaps the present, deplorable waste in local fruit can't be avoided. But we would like to see some competent authority make a study of the problem, before we accept such a depressing conclusion.—Medford Mail-Tribune.

Carelessly-Lost Dollars

Criticizing the efficiency of a business concern is one of the favorite all-season sports of many persons who are thoroughly unbusinesslike in their conduct of their own affairs.

One of the leading publications of the country announces a recent issue that it has in its files several thousand dollars that do not belong to it. These dollars came in, a few at a time, as remittances without any sort of identification of the sender.

The magazine cites a typical instance.

An abusive letter came to the office one day asking how it expected "to keep customers with such treatment" and stating that the writer had an account with the company, had agreed to pay \$5 a month for a set of books, had paid two monthly installments and had received no books, no credit and no receipt. The letter was signed with two initials and a name with no indication as to whether the writer was a woman, married or single, or a man.

It took weeks of painstaking correspondence before the firm could elicit from the wrathful subscriber that the person signing the letter had ordered the books as a Miss Someone Else in St. Louis. She had married soon after and removed to a town in Illinois without notifying the company of her change of name and address. She sent in her two monthly payments from Illinois, a five-dollar bill each time, one with her husband's name written on a piece of paper and pinned to the bill, the other with no writing at all.

And there are scores of other similar souls doing exactly the same thing.—Albany Democrat.
