THE HATRED OF SHAMS.

The people of these times are tried of shams and pretences, just as they are sick of a lot of the sham furniture and ornaments with which our grandfathers used to fill their parlors. The young crowd are especially critical of any false feeling of smugness, and they claim they are going to stand for frank sincerity. This is a fine spirit, within proper limits. The man who pretends to be something different from what he is, and covers up his wrongs and vices with a fair face of respectability, is the object of aversion. But some people carry this feeling so far that they become knockers at the whole social order. They claim the churches are full of hypocrites, that the government is full of dishonest people, that people go into philanthropies for self advertising, that the business world is full of rottenness, and so on. A lot of these people go so far that they would like to smash the whole social system, to destroy the existing church, overturn our present form of government, and make an entirely fresh start. But the faults in society of which people complain are the result of the basic faults of human nature. If churches and schools and governments were all torn up by the roots and rebuilt on a new basis, they would show the same old faults of human nature. The valuable experience that the race has reaped up in centuries of development, would be lost. It is a fine thing for people to be frank and sincere. But they need not get the idea that the world is full of corruption, and that the institutions that society has built up after centuries of experimenting, are mostly false and unsound.

There are some people who still believe that capital punishment should be annulled. What would this class suggest as a "fair and impartial" way of administering justice to the band of outlaws that murdered the four railway employees in the Siskiyou mountains last week? Surely the hangman's noose is not too severe punishment for the gang of cut-throats.

It's funny how Sunday as a day of rest affects some workmen. They make it so strenuous that it takes about three days to recover from the "shock." Then wait three days to "kill" another Sunday in order to be out of commission four days each week. This is what might be termed inefficiency with all the frills.

Business in all lines is usually greatly stimulated during the month of October. Even the cut-throats, murderers, automobile thieves and perpetrators of all sorts of petty crimes are on the job bright and early taking their daily toll—and getting away with it.

TOURIST HURT IN AUTO WRECK

Idaho Man Gets Broken Ribs When Truck Turns Over Onto Car

SAVES LIFE OF HIS SON

In Excitement Father Holds Up Heavy Load Until Small Son Is Out of Danger—Back Is Sprained

George O'Brien, of Darwood, Idaho, received two broken ribs and a badly sprained back, late Saturday afternoon, in an automobile accident which occurred at the corner of Stephens and Mosher streets. In saving the life of his young son, Mr. O'Brien lifted a load which ordinarily no three men could hold up, the pressure on his back being enough to cause in two ribs and bruise and strain the muscles.

The accident occurred when a truck loaded with apples from Fred Hamilton's Half Moon orchards, collided with O'Brien's touring car. The truck was driven by E. P. Barton, and was proceeding west on Mosher street and Mr. O'Brien with his wife and young son in his car was going south on Stephens.

This corner is a particularly bad one, vision being obscured by trees until a driver is almost into the intersection. The truck and the car reached the corner at the same time and both were unable to stop. O'Brien veered to the right and over the curb and sidewalk, and Barton tried to turn his truck into Stephens street.

As a result of this movement the two machines were side by side, with the truck on the left. The sudden swerve in the truck's movement caused the machine to turn over on its side. It was piled high with boxes of apples, and the height of the load helped to cause it to go over easily.

Mr. O'Brien saw the heavy load crashing down on his car, and he instantly thought of his boy in the back seat directly in the way of the toppling load. Instinctively the father braced himself and as the load came down caught it on his back and held it off of the boy until the child was out of danger. When the load was released it cut clear through the body of the car, so great was its weight. The excitement of the moment is the only reason given by Mr. O'Brien for his ability to hold up the tremendous load for the few seconds that enabled the boy to reach safety. Under ordinary circumstances the average man could not budge such a weight.

Mr. O'Brien was rushed to the office of Dr. Melvin where an X-ray was made showing two ribs broken near the backbone. The injuries are very painful and will keep the Idaho man confined to his bed for several days.

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—The entire scheme of government reclamation development is endangered by the present situation of more important projects, Secretary Work declared today, opening the initial fact-finding committee called to formulate a new reclamation policy.

must be effected, he said, if the settlers are to be protected from the loss and the interests of the government safe-guarded.

Secretary Work told the committee that complaints began to reach him soon after he assumed office, including charges that in many projects the original estimates under which the settlers were induced to go upon the projects were 50 to 100 per cent too low and that the actual cost has been so great that it is impossible for the farmers to pay out within the time fixed by law, or even at all. He also said that mistakes, engineering and otherwise, added materially to the cost of the projects; that some of the projects had been undertaken that should never have been started; and that the overhead cost of the service and of the individual projects were burdensome and excessive.
