LOCAL SCHOOLS BADLY CROWDED

Every Seat in the School Rooms Taken and Some Grades Contain Over Fifty Pupils—Record Enrollment Reported

The Roseburg schools are showing a big increase over last year, according to City School Superintendent M. S. Hamm. A report prepared by him and given below, shows that the number of pupils enrolled was 1,240 on October 5. Since that time more than fifty pupils, who were not counted in the report, have entered the school, making approximately 1,290 more pupils this year than were enrolled last year.

Mr. Hamm reports that the rooms in the schools are crowded to capacity and a very congested condition exists. The 5th and 6th grades at the Rose school and the 4th grade at the Benson school have 53 pupils. Nearly all of the other rooms of the schools are accommodating more than forty pupils.

Every seat in the various school rooms has been taken, and the rooms are exceedingly crowded.

Mr. Hamm's report for the first school month, ending October 5, is as follows:

Total pupils enrolled to date, 1,240; average number pupils belonging, 1,183.2; average daily attendance, 1,160.4; days absence, 341; per cent of attendance, 98; number tardinesses, 52; number pupils neither absent nor late, 345; number visits by parents, 26.

WOMAN DRY AGENT CAUGHT IN RAID

EUGENE, Oct. 13.—Minnie Cadden, or Minnie Cadden Larkin, who was being given a tryout as a state prohibition agent, is in jail here as a result of a liquor raid last night in which she and four men were arrested in a new big automobile with about 150 quarts of liquor, valued at \$1000. Ten men participated in the raid.

The woman wears an agent's star, which has been taken from her by order of the governor. She said she was in the car to get evidence. State Prohibition Officer Cleaver is said to have offered by telephone to go her bond, and is en route here from Salem.

As a result of the raid, S. G. Barker, alleged Portland booze runner, at midnight last night was fined \$500 and given six months on a possession charge; Tom Keenan, Marcola stage driver, was given \$500 and four months on a similar charge, and Arthur Kalanquin was fined \$300 on a liquor transportation charge. Kalanquin is in jail unable to pay the fine.

Bob Bobo, fourth man in the car, who is alleged to have supplied the liquor, pleaded not guilty and is held in jail. The woman also pleaded not guilty. Both are charged with possession.

The raid was cleverly staged. A man giving the name of W. S. Jeffery came from Portland and announced that he planned to establish a moving picture studio here and to bring 40 actors from Hollywood. He had a stage started and had begun to remodel an old house near here for the studio. He let it be known that he wanted a considerable amount of liquor for his actors and the negotiations leading to the raid followed.

The woman posed at the time of the raid as the wife of Barker, but later said she had not known him before the day of the raid. The proprietor of a rooming house here, however, said that the woman had been at her house two nights, prior to the raid, with Barker.
