BOOZE RUNNERS ARE CAPTURED

Lane County Officers Take
Pair Engaged in Handling
Bootleg Liquor

LOCAL AUTHORITIES AID

Man Believed to Be Member
of Booze Running Ring
Stopped on Way From
Myrtle Point

ROSEBURG, Oct. 18.—Two "booze runners," using a Dodge roadster, that was capable of extraordinary speed, were captured at 5 o'clock this morning on the Coos Bay highway by Deputy Sheriff Rodney Roach, Van Staveren and Earl Humphrey. The three officers had waited all night to catch the men.

The two are Harry Oles and N. J. Hansen of Portland, Ore., who has been a mate at sea, is a bellhop at the Oregon Hotel at Portland, he told the officers. They are now in the county jail.

Every car that traveled north on the highway during the night was flagged down by the officers. The liquor laden car stopped at the officer's commands, as had all others preceding it, but halted about 100 feet away and when the deputies, afoot started toward the machine, the two occupants shoved on all the power at their command and whizzed through the cordon. Two motorcycles were put on the chase and the men captured in a mile and a half, although they were doing better than 50 miles an hour.

One of the two got out on the running board, while the car was in flight, opened the compartment in the rear and dumped out 12 bottles of liquor and one. Three of them broke, but the others are held as evidence. The whiskey, said to be the vilest of moonshine, is put up in "Lawson's Liquor Whiskey, Dundee, Scotland," by the use of counterfeit labels. Two other bottles are labeled as "dry Martini." These, too, are faked, it is believed.

When brought before Acting Justice Harold J. Wells in justice court, the prisoners pleaded not guilty, and asked to have an attorney. Their bond was set at \$1000 each. It is expected they will meet this sum and secure their temporary freedom, as their books show them to be possessors of considerable cash. According to the affidavits the men were taking in from \$50 to \$100 every day.

Oles yesterday afternoon registered at a local hotel with his wife, so he must have secured the liquor somewhere in southern Oregon, officers believe. His wife checked out this morning for Roseburg, before she heard of her husband's arrest.

Local officers have been working with Lane county officials in the capture of the booze runners taken in Eugene yesterday. The liquor was brought out from Coos Bay over the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway and it is stated a regular traffic has been built up by these parties and they have been under suspicion for several weeks.

The party stopped in a local hotel on Wednesday night. It is stated that they had several bottles of liquor at that time, and that they became partially intoxicated. The local officers were notified, and made a search of their room, but they had previously disposed of the emptied bottles and consequently were not held. They immediately left, however, in their car, as they were apparently afraid that evidence against them would be procured.

Sheriff Starnes and Deputy Sheriff Shamrock yesterday stopped and searched the car of Charles Bender, who was traveling from Coos Bay to Roseburg. Sheriff Starnes states that he believes Bender was one of the parties engaged in handling liquor from Coos Bay points to Portland, and stopped the car in the hope of being able to intercept another delivery.

It is understood that the car taken in Eugene and driven by Oles, belongs to Mr. Bender, and that Bender was driving Oles' machine, this being a practice sometimes followed to avoid confiscation of cars engaged in handling liquor. Sheriff Starnes believes that Bender was warned by telephone by Mrs. Oles, who was questioned when her return to Roseburg yesterday, following her husband's arrest.

Bender's car carried no load of liquor, but the officers, who followed him from Myrtle Point to the Coos Bay county line, so that they might arrest him on this side of the boundary, placed a charge of speeding against him, as they claim that he maintained a high rate of speed over the Coos Bay highway. He came on in to Roseburg and told a story of 112 to the local justice court.

ROMANCE OF MERRY WIDOW IS WRECKED

Glimmering Woman Finds She
Was Wedded to Phantom;
He Lands in Jail

ROSEBURG, N. Y., Oct. 18.—After eloping with a bigamist, who married her in their honeymoon and finally seeing him flee back to his

first wife and beg her help when the police picked up his trail, Mrs. Anna Webster, of Johnson City, has won freedom from Sanford Van Zandt, Johnson City business man, whose double life landed him in jail. Mrs. Webster obtained an annulment.

Van Zandt had a wife who lived only a few blocks from Mrs. Webster, who used to be known as "the merry widow."

Drab disappointment today takes the place of rosy romance with "the merry widow." All she has now is the mocking memory of the few crowded hours of her honeymoon last spring.

After Van Zandt had ducked around the corner from his home in Johnson City many a night, and made passionate love to her, she agreed to run away with him and be married. Though he was leading this daring double life, his own wife remained innocently unaware of it until after the elopement.

RECORD SET FOR
RED CLOVER YIELD

H. F. Wells of Benton Valley, has beaten an Oregon record to the production of red clover seed, according to County Agent D. W. Cooney. Mr. Wells planted six acres to red clover and from three acres procured 12 bushels of seed per acre and from the remaining three acres took 9 bushels per acre. In addition he procured one crop of hay from the field. Ten bushels of red clover seed to the acre is believed to be the record in Oregon prior to this year.

Mr. Cooney states that there is a great deal of land suitable for growing of red clover for seed and that the clover yield should be increased by at least 300 per cent.

Mr. Cooney states that there is also a great opportunity here for the production of alfalfa for hay and seed. He has been over a great portion of the country west of the Mississippi, and says that there is no section where the conditions for alfalfa production are better than in Douglas county.

By planting in rows so that it may be cultivated for seed, much land not now in use could be made to bring in excellent returns. The climatic conditions are ideal for this purpose, and he hopes in the near future to interest growers in this industry.

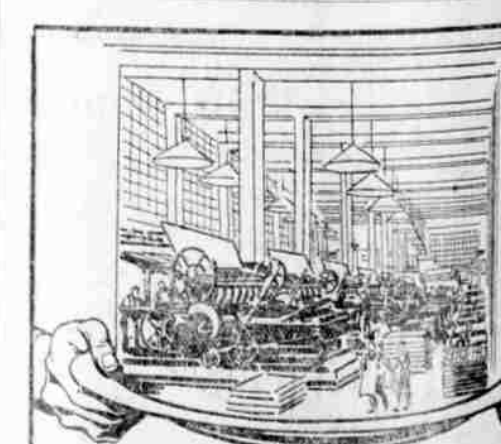
