W. B. EWING OUT FOR CONGRESS

Oakland Farmer and Stock-
Raiser Seeking Nomination
of Democratic Party

AGAINST HIGH TARIFF

Believes Government Should
Give Greater Support to
Agricultural Industry
of the Country

W. B. Ewing, well known farmer
and stock raiser of the Oakland vi-
cinity, has announced himself as a
democratic candidate for congress,
subject to the democratic primaries
in the first district. Mr. Ewing is
well known throughout the dis-
trict and recently was the demo-
cratic nominee for the state legisla-
ture. In his statement to the voters
of the district, Mr. Ewing says:

"I have been farming and stock-
raising in Oregon for forty years. I
was born and raised in Solano county,
California.

"I endeavor to maintain an impar-
tial view in all business at the same
time representing agriculture as the
leading industry of our nation, and
claim that it should be so regarded
by congress and that in no event
should laws be maintained that shall
act as an injury and discouragement
to the farming industry. Our nation
is made rich by the efforts and
should further continue in the near-
est future to maintain it would fall be-
hind to the balance of trade between
nations.

"High tariff is a direct injury to
farming as it prevents us buying
from other countries and they can-
not buy what we have from them.

"Our banking, manufacturing and
shipping interests have been fac-
tored while our farming has had lit-
tle or no government support. Es-
pecially has farm credit been very
bad and interest high to such an ex-
tent that the farmer has been forced
to sell his produce far below its value
instead of holding it and export-
ing it in a businesslike manner. They
have been the victims of Wall Street
contraction of money and the specu-
lators. The farmers cannot pay their
interest and are doomed to worse
poverty if they cannot obtain credit
at low interest rates that they are
able to pay.

"Wall Street power of contracting

"I liken the program to filling a
barrel, by tariff, subsidies, stabili-
zation, etc., through the bung-

While the government pours in at
the bung-hole, it runs out at both
ends into the coffers of Wall Street.
"Congress is all-powerful and can
devise and enforce laws that will pre-
vent the rich from imposing on the
poor, and prevent the rich from get-
ting richer while the poor are get-
ting poorer.

"If elected to congress I will sit
with that body of men who will en-
deavor to maintain a form of govern-
ment based on principles of honor,
justice, fraternity, love and pro-
gressiveness, and discourage govern-
ment by money power and greed."
