WORK RESUMED ON POWER LINE

Work on the power line between Roseburg and Myrtle Creek was resumed today after an interruption of about a month due to right of way difficulties. All of the materials have been on hand for the past six weeks, and work was progressing rapidly up to the 15th of September, when difficulties over the right of way between Roseburg and Myrtle Creek caused the California Oregon Power company to withdraw its workmen and halt further activities until these matters were settled.

Agreements have been reached with the property owners affected and the work has again been started, workmen going out this morning to resume construction. Owing to weather conditions progress may be a little slower than was anticipated, but it is believed that the line will be completed within thirty days. The power company has contracts with the cities of Myrtle Creek and Riddle to supply light and power for those places.
