## FEDERAL HEARING IS HELD TODAY

Alleged Mail Robbers and White Slavers Before U. S. Commissioner Hopkins

U. S. ATTORNEY HERE

Federal Officers Ask That Bail for Tomlinson Be Fixed in Sum of \$10,000, as Crime Is Serious One

The preliminary hearing before U. S. Commissioner Charles P. Hopkins of the cases against Raymond Tomlinson and George Stone, accused of mail robberies, and Carl and John Foster alleged white slavers, was held in the federal building this morning. U. S. Attorney John S. Coke and Assistant Clarence Vinick, were present and also postal inspectors E. C. Clements and G. E. Hougen.

Tomlinson and Stone were given a hearing on a charge of robbing the U. S. mails at Myrtle Creek. "This is a very serious charge," Attorney Vinick said, "and that is why we are here in force. Tampering with the U. S. mails is not a matter to be lightly considered and anyone who commits such a crime may expect to suffer a severe penalty."

The federal officers have asked that Tomlinson's bail be fixed in the sum of \$10,000 and that Stone's be set at \$5,000. Tomlinson is believed to have been the prime mover in the crime, the officers state. He is much older than Stone, and is thought to have influenced the boys. Attorney John Long is appearing in Tomlinson's behalf.

Carl Foster, aged 18, and John Foster, aged 20, were bound over to the federal grand jury on a charge of white slavery, and Irma Morrow and Ruby Munn, aged 15 and 16, were held under \$500 bonds as material witnesses.

They were arrested in Roseburg yesterday afternoon as they were on their way north. The boys are from Torlock, California, and the girls are from Modesta. Ruby intended to marry Carl. The elopement took place in John Foster's car and they stopped at several places in California registering as man and wife under the name of Flek.

"The surprising part of this case is the age of the persons involved," Mr. Vinick said. "The oldest member of the party is 20 years of age. He has been married since he was sixteen and has a wife and four year old child who were deserted by him in this elopement. His brother is 18 years of age and the girls are 15 and 16 years. They are all just children but must face a severe charge and penalty."

## PURSUIT OF BANDIT SUSPECTS QUICKENS

YREKA, Calif., Oct. 27.—The pursuit of the four men believed to be the Southern Pacific bandit-murderers quickened in the Blue Canyon country of the Klamath national forest. Reports coming back from the line of search were meager but word is expected here at any hour that the alleged bandits have been overtaken.

## DECLARES KLAN DOMINATES STATE

OKLAHOMA CITY, Oct. 27.—Charging that not only the lower house of the Oklahoma legislature, but also practically "every department of the state" is controlled by the Ku Klux Klan, governor Walton in a statement today asserted the present question in the state was "not shall I be impeached, but shall the government as handed to us by the patriots of the past continue to exist?"

## TWO STREET CARS COLLIDE HEADON

PORTLAND, Oct. 27.—Two Vancouver interurban cars collided head on this morning on a single track trestle 20 feet above a slough. Motorman Vanvliet of the southbound car, was seriously injured and a woman passenger cut. The vestibules of both cars were smashed. Neither car left the tracks. A serious disaster was thus narrowly averted. The collision occurred in a heavy fog, and was due to one car failing to observe the block signal.

## CONFERENCE OF ALL POWERS TO BE HELD

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—A conference of powers, including the United States, will probably be convened before Christmas for the purpose of settling the reparations problem, according to a belief expressed in informed quarters. The fact that high American officials regard as satisfactory the French reply to this country's proposition makes it probable that such an economic conference would be held.

## SITUATION IN MIDANAO SERIOUS

MANILA, Oct. 27.—Political developments reported from Moro country within the last 24 hours indicate that the situation in the Philippines is the most serious and complicated since the American administration was established. O. E. McKeen, a wealthy cattle ranchman, of Midanao and a son-in-law of the Sultan of Sulu, told the Associated Press on his arrival in Manila today that the spirit of unrest and revolt was widespread throughout Midanao and talk of an uprising on a larger scale than ever before was general among the Moros.

## STAGE DRIVER IS KILLED BY WOMAN

(Associated Press.)  
PENDLETON, Oct. 27.—Gordon Mettler, a married man of Ukiah, Oregon, was shot and killed today by Miss Nora Ellis, aged 26 years, of Ukiah, according to reports to the sheriff's office. The shooting was near the Walker Ellis place, near Ukiah. Mettler was in an automobile when shot, the machine belonging to the stage line he operated between Ukiah and Pilot Rock. Miss Ellis, who is being brought to Pendleton, the sheriff's office reports, has confessed but gave no motive.

## TAX SPEAKER COMING

Seymour Jones, of Marion county, ex-speaker of the House of Representatives, will speak in Roseburg on Tuesday night, October 30, giving information on the income tax measure which is to be voted upon at the coming special election. The place of the meeting has not yet been arranged but will be announced on Monday. Mr. Jones has made a close study of this bill and will present facts concerning it. Arrangements for the meeting are being made by Attorney O. P. Coshow.
