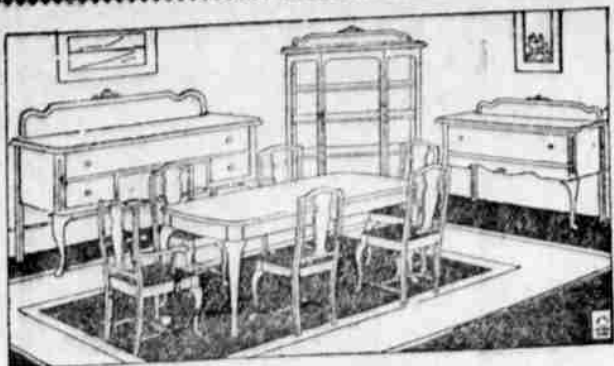

MAY FORECAST FUTURE QUAKES, SAYS SCIENTIST

Stanford University Expert Completes Map Showing Potential Quake Area

IS GUIDE TO BUILDERS

Fire Following Temblors Is Not Necessary, University Man Declares in an Interview

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Oct. 30.—Scientists may within the next few years forecast earthquake shocks as they now do the coming storm, according to Professor Bailey Willis, of Stanford University. Professor Willis has just completed for the Seismological Society of America an earthquake map of California, on which is outlined the geological faults along which earthquakes are likely to occur. The map is designed chiefly for the benefit of constructionists and architects in order that they may avoid building structures where they are subject to "natural damages."

"A fault," says Professor Willis, "is a break in the rocks. These breaks are usually many miles long, and as
