SPENDING LESS PUBLIC MONEY

Spending less public money would be about the best way to reduce taxes in Oregon—not to invoke an income tax on the people that more money might be raised to spend. People, as a rule, have little faith in much of the propaganda now being dispensed in behalf of the new measure. They do not believe, and they are probably about right in their opinion, that if the state is given a million dollars more upon which to operate that this sum will not materially reduce taxes. They don't believe any good will come from it for the simple reason that past promises in the way of tax reduction has not been fulfilled, but on the contrary, keeps soaring higher and higher each succeeding year. There is no proof that the present income tax measure before the people is going to show any material gain in the way of tax reduction. There is no getting away from the fact that it is going to increase taxation, and there is no certainty if the sum realized through an income tax is placed to the credit of the state tax fund that the people will ever feel the results. No one knows what it will cost to put the measure in operation. The sum of \$25,000 provided to collect an income tax from residents of Oregon is a perfect joke. It costs the federal government some \$137,000 to cover the job in this state, and how can Oregon do a bigger job for a less sum?

One thing is positive, those who already pay taxes are going to pay more. It is a new tax and will reach the majority of the people with the exception of a comparative few who have large holdings of general property with moderate incomes.

Spending less public money would help to a great extent in lowering taxes, but in this fast age of living the public demands those things that creates higher taxes, and the public is much to blame for the very thing that they are trying to discredit—higher taxes.
