WORK PROGRESSES ON STREET LIGHTS
Work on the new street lighting system is progressing as rapidly as workmen can dig the trenches into which the cables are to be placed. The drill, operated by compressed air, has been used in cutting the trenches on these blocks on Jackson street and the ditches are now being cleared ready to receive the cable. This wire is heavily armored and insulated and will be good for a great many years as it is waterproof and being sealed in concrete will serve its purpose indefinitely. The electricians are ready to proceed with their part of the work and are waiting only for the payment contract to be finished. The work of installation will be completed on Jackson street while the payment is being cut on Cass.
