EDUCATION WEEK TO BE OBSERVED

Three years ago the American Legion, in conjunction with the National Education association and the United States bureau of education, to reduce illiteracy, provide for the Americanization of foreigners in our land and to encourage greater interest in the schooling of future citizens, established American Education Week. President Coolidge has proclaimed the observance of this week, Nov. 18-24, throughout the land.

The local Umpqua Legion post and the educators of Douglas county are requesting the assistance of all agencies in promoting this cause. In general the ministers are requested to speak on some educational theme at one of their services on November 18, the churches are asked to display slides urging greater interest in schools and more frequent visitation by parents; all fraternal and civic organizations are petitioned to have some one speak at their meetings during this week on some educational theme; the county press is urged to give liberal publicity to this cause; mayors should issue proclamations for the proper observance of the week.

In Roseburg, in addition to the above, upper grade school pupils will write short essays on educational topics, some of which will be published. They will also prepare for display, many posters with spicy, suggestive educational slogans and statements. Each school will urge all parents to come to the building on the first semester's visitation day, Friday, November 23.

Numerous other activities are planned and steps will be taken to bring about a wide observance of the week. The local arrangements are in charge of a committee composed of John E. Flurry, representing Umpqua Post of the American Legion; M. S. Hamm, superintendent of city schools, and O. C. Brown, superintendent of county schools.

DESIGNATION IS MADE OF ROADS IN FEDERAL AID HIGHWAY SYSTEM

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Designation of all roads in the Federal-aid highway system, comprising about 185,000 miles, practically has been completed and approved by the bureau of public roads. The selection of seven percent of the roads of the nation for future systematic improvement is declared by the government's road officials to have been the largest and most important task assigned to the bureau. Many conferences have been held with highway officials representing adjacent states in the process of correlating the roads of the primary, or interstate, highways and many difficult situations have been adjusted.

The last of the tentative maps showing the system proposed by the federal states has been received by the government and the work of preparing a map of the Federal-aid highway system of the country is well under way. The Federal highway act requires that the bureau of public roads shall be issued thereafter from time to time showing the progress of selection, construction, and reconstruction.

The first map of the system will probably be in two sections, one of the eastern half, the other of the western half of the United States. These maps will be six feet long and four feet wide and will show the primary, or interstate, and secondary, or intercounty highways selected. In the production of the map every possible use was made of other map producing agencies of the government to reduce to a minimum the expenditures in the way of original drafting.

AUTO THEIF IS SENT UP FOR THREE YEARS

CORVALLIS, Nov. 5.—Frank Laws alias Frank Nichol, who was arrested in Corvallis a few weeks ago by Traffic Officer Floyd D. Browne on suspicion of having in his possession a stolen car, and who for the past three years has been the admitted champion auto thief of the Pacific coast states, will be forced to abandon his favorite career for at least three years, having been sentenced in Portland by United States District Judge Dean to serve a term of that length in prison.

After Laws' arrest in Corvallis he made his escape in a stolen car and was captured in Salem. Brought back to this city he undertook to make a get-away from Sheriff S. N. Warfield while the officer was unlocking the county jail door. He was captured again at Fourth and Jefferson streets and lodged in jail. Later he was taken to Portland where he was tried in the federal court, and convicted.

Seven years ago, when he was 13 years of age, Laws began stealing automobiles in Northern Washington. In company with two other prisoners he sawed his way out of the Sedro Woolley jail early this year, later stole an automobile from the sheriff of Skagit county and drove to California, stealing three cars enroute. He told federal officers when he was arrested in Corvallis after a chase through the business district in a half of bullets.

About ten days ago Laws complained of an attack of appendicitis and was transferred from the county jail to the county hospital, but the appearance of surgeons, bent upon an operation, caused an immediate recovery.

MONDAY TO BE A LEGAL HOLIDAY

SALEM, Nov. 5.—Governor Pierce issued a proclamation Saturday designating Monday, November 12, a legal holiday in observance of Armistice Day. The Armistice anniversary falls on November 11, but because that falls on Sunday, the observance will be on Monday.

The proclamation follows: Nine years ago last August Europe was catapulted into a tremendous conflict. A powerful menace threatened civilization. The future of nations and peoples everywhere was thrown into the scales of war.

With liberty as the stake, this nation was compelled to enter into the struggle. The wealth, the resources, the man power, the full strength of the nation was dedicated to the purpose of maintaining democracy and civilization. Each state, each city, each hamlet, each family and each individual was called upon to give its all if need be to the successful prosecution of the struggle.

On the 11th day of November 1918 years ago the conflict ended. The principles of freedom had again been established.

In honor of that day and what it gave to us, in honor of the boys who so bravely carried the flag of freedom on to victory, and in honor of all those who sacrificed that democracy and civilization might live, Armistice day has been rightfully celebrated throughout the United States.

Now, therefore, in conformity with the custom of paying tribute to those who made the world safe, I, Walter M. Pierce, by virtue of the authority in me vested as governor of the state of Oregon, do hereby declare the said November 12, A. D. 1923, a legal holiday.

EMPLOYERS TRACE BASIC PRINCIPLES OF BUSINESS LIFE

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—Honesty, integrity and faithfulness, character, love of employer, ambition, personal neatness and unlimited co-operation are the chief qualities boys and girls should cultivate in school in order to become successfully fit for the business world, according to expressions of more than a score of Chicago's biggest business men and employers who were questioned on the subject by the Association of Commerce. They almost all said that a high school education is sufficient to the attainment of the highest success, "provided the study in school is applied correctly to the purpose of the future."

Extracts from some of the answers follow:

"The fundamentals of a successful business life should not be measured in dollars and cents, but in achievements," said J. E. Gorman, president of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railroad. "Honesty, loyalty and ambition may be stated as the basic principles. Personality sometimes goes a long way, but personality without the requisite knowledge does not carry a young man to that height that he would attain by a complete mastery of the subject in hand."

"Cultivate and form the habit of trying to see the best side of your associates and fellow workers; avoid and suppress the habit of knocking and disparaging others; cultivate neatness, tidiness and cheerfulness; courtesy and respect for those in authority," says W. W. K. Sparrow, vice president, Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad.
