The plant employs 350 men working in three eight-hour shifts and turns out 85,000 Ford motor valves and 10,000 Fordson valves daily. Since it was opened in March, 1920, the Northville plant has produced more than 44,000,000 valves. Demand for ammonium sulphate for fertilizer is growing rapidly. During five months nearly 7,000 tons of it were shipped from the River Rouge plant of the Ford Motor company to all parts of the United States. It is a by-product of coke, carries from 20 to 21 per cent available nitrogen and is known as one of the world's best commercial carriers of that element.

NEW OLDSMOBILE COMPLETES RUN

Crossing the continent in 18 days with gears sealed in high during the entire journey was the proof offered to Angelinos by the Olds Motor Works of Lansing, Mich., of the go-getters, get-there abilities of the new Oldsmobile six.

The trip proved that the new \$750 six is not only a price wonder, but also a marvelous road performer.

Not content with a demonstration of the new Oldsmobile's long distance dependability, its transcontinental pilot at the conclusion of the long run took his mount out to Beverly Bowl to prove that the new six has speed as well as endurance. In the presence of racing officials, newspaper men and visitors the new Oldsmobile showed a speed of 68 miles per hour. The trial was made with the car in the same condition and equipped as it was at the end of its long run. Racing wisecracks say that this is the best speed ever shown by a stock car of this class.

The try-out of the new Oldsmobile was entrusted to "Cannon Ball" Baker, a seasoned veteran of many motor car drives between the Atlantic and the Pacific coasts.

On his departure from New York on October 8th, newspaper men sealed his gears and Alfred Reeves, general manager of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, entrusted to Baker a letter to Mayor Cryer, who was on hand to greet the car at its finish in Los Angeles.

"This is my thirty-second trip from coast to coast," said Baker, "and I encountered some of the most severe going that I have ever been my fortune to run into—snow storms, mud, washed out roads and everything. But that little Oldsmobile, with only the high gear in it, not only brought me through storm and over mountain passes, but used only 18 ounces of oil and made a gas average of 28.8 miles to the gallon."

Baker also asserted that the cooling of the car was also a remarkable feature. In order that the engine might be kept warm enough to function properly, he had a blower device for the radiator. And, in pulling a stiff hill, he got the engine to boiling. That surprised him, he said, and upon investigation he found that he had forgotten to "pull the shade;" the radiator curtain was keeping out the air. Otherwise, he declares, he never found one place where he could overheat the peppy new six-cylinder model "30" Oldsmobile.

Ever since the now famous car was placed on view, the salesroom of the J. W. Leavitt and company, has been thronged with motorists eager to see this wonderful cross-country performer. It will be a part of the Oldsmobile exhibit at the Los Angeles show.

126,000 Miles of Cloth for Cement Sacks

To keep cement moving from the mills to the many building jobs always under way, cement manufacturers require an astonishing quantity of sacks.

This year the industry has considerably more than 225,000,000 sacks. These represent enough cotton cloth to make a skirt for every woman and girl in the United States—126,000 miles of 30-inch fabric. Even a moderate sized mill which ships 1,000,000 barrels a year must have 2,000,000 or so sacks.

When a customer returns a sack he gets credit for it, if it is usable or repairable. The convenient returnable sack means that each plant has to have large departments where men and women sew, sort, clean and count sacks continuously. This work alone costs the industry nearly \$1,250,000 a year.

And cement manufacturers keep increasing their sack inventories so that they can ship promptly. Last year they purchased a total of more than 100,000,000 new cotton sacks. For replacements alone over 50,000,000 were needed; for increased supplies over 30,000,000. In addition over 18,000,000 paper bags were used representing 7,000,000 pounds of paper.

This problem of containers causes a large and steadily growing investment by the portland cement industry.

FORD SALES MAKE NOTABLE INCREASE

DETROIT, Mich., Nov. 6.—How rapidly the trend of sentiment is swinging toward the use of lighter motor car equipment, in order to more satisfactorily meet present day traffic conditions, is emphasized in the tremendous increase in sales of the Ford Motor company for the first three-quarters of the present year. An analysis of these sales show that the sentiment is not alone among passenger car buyers but extends to commercial car purchasers who are finding that the smaller motor haulage unit effects more efficient, speedy and economical delivery service.

Sales of Ford cars and trucks in the United States for the first nine months of the year totaled 1,354,929. It is just announced. This is an increase of 466,433 over the same months of 1922.

In September alone, 141,467 Ford cars and trucks were delivered at retail, a gain of 35,029 over September last year, while truck sales for the month were 26,947 or 4,539 more than in the same month a year ago.

Ford Motor No. 8,500,000 went off the assembly line at the Ford Motor company's plant in Highland Park on October 4. It is announced. The last half million motors were produced in seven days less than three months ago. Motor No. 8,000,000 went out July 11, this year.
