## DOCTOR PERFORMS UNUSUAL OPERATIONS

EAS, WISCONSIN, Nov. 8.—Physicians are still discussing the recent demonstration of Prof. Hans Fenster, surgeon, of the University of Vienna, which he operated during a period of weeks on several patients without use of usually employed anesthetic.

The operations were performed in a local hospital before an audience of over 200 physicians and were of major importance, one being a resection of the stomach, the other a cancer case.

Professor Fenster's method is, technically, the administration of an artificial anesthetic, induced through an

## GIRLS MARRY QUITE YOUNG DOWN SOUTH

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Nov. 8.—Girls marry young in California. The average age of brides in the last year was 17 years.

Thirty percent of all California brides were under 20.

L. E. Ross, director of the state bureau of vital statistics, has compiled interesting data regarding marriage and some of his figures are said to blast certain pet fancies of those who would judge Cupid's arrows for one reason or another. Here are some of the facts his figures tend to indicate.

That the "dangerous age" for girls comes before their twentieth birthday. That comparative safety from Cupid's wiles cannot be attained until after they are 25.

That the single woman over 46 has a better chance of getting married than one between the ages of 40 and 45. To substantiate this assertion Ross' figures show that 53.1 percent of California brides are between 19 and 45, while only 4.7 percent are approaching 50 or beyond it.

For the bachelor girl the first 25 years are the hardest; after that she has a fair chance of remaining a bachelorette, according to the records.

## NEW SPIRIT STIRS AMONG YOUNG MEN OF SOVIET RUSSIA

MOSCOW, Russia, Nov. 5.—(A. P.)—An eighteen year old boy of the coming Russian generation boarded the Riza-Moscow express at a wayside station the other day, and drew the interested attention of a number of foreign passengers. He was truck-like-faced, smiling, energetic, bracing and full of nationalism, and he seemed to typify an important element that, in recent years has come out of the crucible in which the present day leaders of Russia are mixing their international chemicals.

Change this lad's home for a suit of the "college clothes" extensively advertised in America; his round-necked hair cut for the prevailing style across the sea, his suit pressed and for state-sprinkled United States, and he might have been an American boy boasting of his own home town, his own state, and the U. S. A. in general.

The Russian youth was a railroad guard. The locomotive on his train built by Russians ten years ago, and repaired by Russians a few weeks before, was better than any locomotive ever built abroad. Its drive-wheels higher and its speed greater. His train was cleaner, his railway administration was better, his country's crop less, his country's future the richest.

The determination of Peter the Great back in 1725 turned upon his people an acceptance of the idea that the accomplishments of western civilization were superior to their own. This thought lived a long time, for up to six years ago, before the recent revolution. Russians, particularly the educated youth, were inclined to swallow without question the claims of foreign civilization, they often gloried in it as an office in the great practical accomplishment of the German, English, American and French.

In 1917 the Russian Soviet government got out by installing a spirit of internationalism throughout Russia and the world at large and the Third International is still spreading the flag of an international brotherhood, attraction by a revolutionary proletarian dictatorship.

This young railroad guard is a product of the new revolution. Many thousands like him may be found throughout Russia today. Perhaps they have absorbed some inkling of

internationalism from the Third International, but to more than one observer of Russia they seem to be red-blooded, enthusiastic nationalists, and nothing else. The "Red Army" to them means the Russian army; the "Red Fleet" means the Russian fleet, and the "Red Air Service" means the Russian aviation. This boy boasted of his home town, of his state, of his railroad and of Russia in comparison to England, Germany, France and the United States. Internationalism was the last thing in his head. His thoughts were all of Russia, not as a leader in communism, but as a national entity of which he could be proud. He was the exponent of a personal nationalism, youthful and vigorous, produced by the happenings of the last six years that today is readily found by observers who look below the surface of Russia.

There would appear to be also something of this same nationalistic spirit in the hearts and heads of the older communistic crusaders at the Kremlin. Now and then they play nationalistic jokes on their internationalist allies. They play Russia's hand in the international poker game; but for such stakes as Wrangel Island, and such tenaciously to the chips that may be used in some future jack pot involving land, or ports or ships over which once flew the flag of Old Russia.

Such thoughts evidently are in the minds of Lenin, Trotsky and the other leaders. They surely prattle with the young guard on the Riza-Moscow express, who typifies a new spirit abroad in the land.
