AN ARMISTICE DAY THOUGHT

The idea has gained currency to some extent among the soldiers of the World War, that their services are forgotten. They remember how they went away amid cheering crowds, who promised that nothing should be too good for the boys when they got back. But when they came back many of them found jobs gone, and they were forced to walk the streets for many months. Many who came home disabled found delays in getting their cases attended to. It often seemed as if the country had moved on as soon as the peril was over, and had forgotten those who saved their homeland from danger. But whatever mistakes may have been made, the country as a whole has always had the greatest regard and honor for those who served in this war, particularly for those who underwent the fiery baptism of battle. Their services will never be forgotten. The country is not merely grateful, but it is extremely proud of the grand results they achieved. It appreciates the fact that they did things that no old world army could have accomplished in such a short time. It realizes that they manifested a heroism that went far beyond what is ordinarily expected of the soldier, that they counted death as nothing, and they gave all to their country. It still brings tears to the eyes and a clutch to the throat to think of all those little white crosses in the soil of France, of all the newly made graves in our cemeteries, of all the saddened lives of those left at home. But the country is proud of the achievement of the living and the dead. Armistice Day will never be forgotten as the date that closes what is probably the most glorious page of American history.

CITY MEASURES ARE APPROVED

The city measure providing for the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$15,000, to purchase a fire engine, was carried by a vote of 468 to 287, according to the final count. The measure was carried in practically every precinct of the city, the residents generally realizing the need of the city for additional fire protection. The overwhelming majority in favor of the bill, will cause the council to proceed at once with the adoption of a resolution and ordinance issuing the bonds, and no time will be lost in securing the apparatus.

The amendment providing the method by which outside territory may be annexed, was adopted by a vote of 497 to 217. This amendment will allow the city council to call a special election in adjoining territory, whenever the people of the section to be annexed present a petition bearing the required number of names.
