## GLENDALE MAN HURT IN WRECK

Ex-Service Man on Way to Roseburg Celebration Runs Into Auto Driven by City School Superintendent.

Howard Martin of Glendale was quite seriously injured yesterday morning at 11 o'clock when the motorcycle on which he was riding crashed into an automobile driven by M. S. Hamm of this city. The accident occurred at the top of the Stephens street cut on the Pacific highway where Main street cuts into the highway. Fortunately neither of the machines were traveling rapidly and the result was that nobody was fatally hurt. Mr. Martin was thrown from his machine into the side of the bank on the west side of the road and lit with the motorcycle on top of him. The car which Mr. Hamm was driving was a large Willys-Knight and the impact of the collision threw it across the pavement and into the bank on the opposite side of the highway from the motorcycle, damaging the front end of the machine considerably and shaking up the occupants.

Martin was rushed to the Mercy hospital where he was put under the care of Dr. Sether. The doctor reports that the injuries received are in all probability not fatal. Martin's back is said to be severely twisted and his head and face cut and bruised quite badly. Other injuries about the body were also received by Martin but otherwise there is no danger of his not living.

Outside of the damage done the front end of his car Mr. Hamm got out of the accident very luckily. The car he was driving was a new machine and has been driven only a few weeks. The collision demolished the radiator and lights and did some damage to the fender.

Mr. Martin is an ex-service man and was on his way from Glendale to attend the celebration here. His motorcycle was not damaged to any extent outside of slight damage to the front fork and the tail light. In spite of the fact that he collided with a heavier machine he did not receive as great a shock as would ordinarily have been the case.

EUGENE TO HAVE HOTEL.  
 EUGENE, Nov. 12.—Erection of a new and modern hotel for Eugene at an approximate cost of \$225,000, to be located at the southeast corner of Ninth avenue west and Olive street is assured, according to the announcement of Harry Hutton following a meeting last night at the chamber of commerce of a group of local men who are financing the project. A committee was named at the meeting to make a further investigation of the cost and a report will be turned in next week and then active work on the excavation for the building will start. Is the positive statement of Mr. Hutton, who has been active in the promotion of the plan here and will have the lease on the new hotel.

A total of \$200,000 has already been subscribed for the project and all the capital has been pledged by Eugene men, including one block of \$50,000. The committee that will investigate the cost figures is composed of Richard Shore Smith, Frank X. Schneiders, Fred E. Chambers and O. R. Guillon, all of whom are financially interested in the new building.
