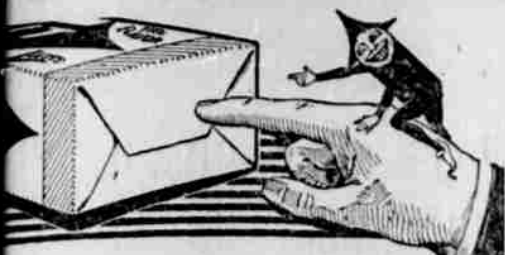

ESSAYS WRITTEN BY SCHOOL CHILDREN HOLD UP IMPORTANCE OF EDUCATION IN BUSINESS AND POLITICAL LIFE

This week is being observed in the schools of the city and county as Education Week, and special emphasis is being given educational consideration and discussion in the schools and in public gatherings. Pupils in the grade schools have been asked to write essays on the subject of education and the best of these have been selected from the different schools. The News-Review in co-operation with the school officials has agreed to publish these essays chosen as the best turned in by the students and will endeavor to publish two of these compositions each day. Following are two short articles written by the children whose names are signed and who have been judged to have written essays which have ranked among the best:

"Why An Education Is Important."
A truly democratic country must have a public school system which gives education free to all. Only in a few countries has this ideal been realized. Principally in the United States, Canada and England. Until the nineteenth century education was considered a privilege of the higher class only.

Little by little all the states came to establish free public schools. Strange as it may seem many people opposed this idea. However not all of them were as sincere in this belief as governor Berkeley of Virginia, who believed that education would bring disobedience into the world.

In time it was found that education was fast becoming not only a right but a duty. This led to compulsory education law. This law was followed by one preventing child labor. At length the states obtained high schools. There was no law however, forcing people to attend these schools.

It is of course quite impossible to estimate exactly the value of education received in schools and colleges but we do know this. That the child with no schooling has one chance in elementary education. He has four forming distinguished service. With a hundred and fifty thousand of per centes the chance.

Without education it is almost impossible to obtain employment. Some of our greatest men today would not be known if it were not for their education. It is said that one must have an education in order to be civilized. This does not mean entirely that if we are not educated we are savages. It simply means with the increasing of education and learning in the civilized world we must have an education.

We should all try to get the best education possible that we may be successful in business, use judgment in voting or making laws, and if elected to office, fill that place well.

She visited here at the Haynes residence two years ago. Four children survive: Mrs. Julian Josephson of Hollywood, California; Mrs. Percy Kerr, of Detroit; George Haynes of San Francisco; and Fred Haynes of Roseburg.

The body will be brought to Roseburg for burial, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Julian Josephson, and George Haynes. The funeral arrangements will be announced later.

CENSUS SHOWS A POPULATION OF 8,810

H. B. Church has just about completed the tabulation made in connection with the school census. He has made a thorough canvass of the city and has found that there are 1,722 children of school age residing in the community. This includes the Edenbower, West Roseburg and Miller's Addition districts which are tributary to the Roseburg schools, but which are outside the city limits. There may be a few changes in the total figures if it is found that some children have not been checked, but the census has been carefully taken and there will be little change made. Last year's census showed a total of 1,645 pupils, showing that there has been considerable increase. On the usual basis of estimating population from the school census, Roseburg, counting the districts enumerated outside the city limits, has a population of 8,810. On the same basis of calculation the city has increased in population by 373 since the last school census.
