THRICE WED AT 21. WINS BIGAMY CASE

First Venture at Thirteen Is Not Bigamous Because She Was Under Age, Jury Holds

(International News Service.) ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 20.—Slight and beautiful Mrs. Margaret Brookline, who, at the age of 21, is credited with having married three husbands, appeared in the superior court here recently on a charge of bigamy, filed by her second husband. The young woman, according to evidence, married at the age of 13 a man named John McCord. A child was born of the union, but soon after the youthful mother received information which led her to believe McCord was dead. Months passed and McCord did not show up, so she married Lon Powers.

A short time afterwards the startling news came that McCord was still living. The young woman immediately left Powers, at the same time instituting suit for divorce against McCord, a decree being granted. But instead of going back to either of her former husbands she chose to take unto herself a third protector, a Sam Brookline, of Atlanta.

In the trial Powers, the second husband, attempted to institute a charge of bigamy because the woman had married him while still wedded to her first husband. Returning the verdict the jury held that the original marriage to McCord was void because the bride was only 13 years old at the time, below the age at which a woman may consent to marriage. The bigamy charge fell.

FOOTBALL CLASSIC ON NEXT SATURDAY

Oregon-O. A. C. Game Will Attract Large Crowds—Both Teams Are in Tip Top Shape and Full of Fight.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Nov. 20.—(Special).—There is no science in an Oregon-O. A. C. football game, it's just a question of fight, was the way "Shy" Huntington, coach for the varsity, characterized Oregon's Homecoming game, to be played with O. A. C. in Eugene next Saturday.

In referring to the condition of the varsity team Coach Huntington said, "They are in better shape now than they have been before this season." This means that a number of men—Vonder Ahe, tackle, and Terjesen, full-back, for instance—who were on the shelf when the varsity mixed with the Cardinals, will be back in the lineup again for the go with the Aggies.

Huntington has a new end in Don Zimmerman, baseball and basketball letterman. Don came out on the field the other day in lieu of going to a gym class and showed so much football ability that Coach Huntington annexed the new talent for the varsity lineup. "Zimmerman is a whiz for speed, spirit and fight," declared the coach in referring to his new addition to the squad.

Early last week Oregon's ingenious coach decided that he would illuminate Hayward field so that his men could stay for practice as long as they were able to stand up. As a result there have been strenuous rehearsals in the fundamentals of football, signal practice, and tackling work during the last few days. Next week the varsity will mix with the fresh in defensive and offensive work as a means of final preparation for the mix with the Aggies.

During the past 25 years of football playing with the Aggies, the varsity has lost but four games to the Corvallis players. And none of those dropped to the Aggies were homecoming games. The varsity has a tradition to maintain.

Jack Benefield, graduate manager for the Associated Students, expects a record crowd on Hayward field next Saturday. In preparation for the invasions of fans he has roofed a section of the bleachers, and reports that he can comfortably seat the 16,000 spectators who are expected to attend the state football classic.

There is some kind of a motor vehicle for every eight persons in the United States, according to statistics just made public by the department of agriculture.

More than 13,002,427 motor vehicles are now in operation in the United States as compared with 3,512,996 in 1916, the department stated.

This large increase since 1916 the department stated has been systematic and at the rate of more than 600,000 every six months, and no indication of retardation is noted.

There are now 11,571,181 pleasure cars, 66,188 hired vehicles (including buses, etc.), 1,271,055 trucks and 141,521 motorcycles registered throughout the country.

CALIFORNIA ADOPTS OREGON WOOL PLANS

The California Wool Growers' association passed a resolution favoring the marketing of the California clip co-operatively on the Oregon plan following an address before the convention Friday in San Francisco, by R. A. Ward, manager of the Pacific Co-operative Wool Growers' of Portland, Oregon.

The wool marketing committee of the California association favored consolidation with the Pacific Co-operative Wool Growers. Inasmuch as the latter organization is now incorporated in California and serves a number of wool growers from the northern part of the state, arrangements have been completed for the California members to concentrate their wools from central California at Vina where warehouse facilities have been secured. Selling will be done through the association's office in Portland, Oregon.

The new arrangement will greatly increase the volume of wool handled by the Pacific Co-operative Wool Growers, and as a result the present low handling costs will be still further reduced. Members of the association now comprise 2600 wool growers from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and northern California. Officials representing the California growers will meet with officers and directors of the local organization in complete details of the federation.

MOOSE LODGE IS STARTING DRIVE

The local order of Moose initiated ten candidates last evening at their session after which a social time was enjoyed and a banquet served. M. P. Murphy, of the Portland lodge, is here in the interests of the membership drive which the Oregon Moose are inaugurating and states that a film showing Mooseheart and all the particulars connected therewith, will be exhibited in Roseburg at a local theater in the near future. The lodge has a home which cares for 1200 children and the great work of the order is known throughout the country. One of the supreme representatives of the I. O. O. M. will visit
