R. H. MAYNARD TO BUILD SAW MILL

R. H. Maynard, who formerly operated a sawmill at the Curry estate near Brown's bridge, later purchasing the mill in Astoria, where he sold his interests, has secured about 5,000,000 feet of fine saw timber on Rice creek, four miles from Astoria, and will erect a mill at once. Mr. Maynard, who is a native sawmill man, has ordered a new mill from Portland, and expects to have the plant in operation shortly after the first of the year. He states that the plant will have a capacity of approximately 15,000 feet daily. The mill will be operated by steam, and the short haul to railway makes marketing of the product of the mill an easy matter.

JURY HEARS SUIT ON PROMISSORY NOTE

The suit of L. W. Robinson against J. H. Howkins was heard in the circuit court today. The suit is one in which Robinson is judge on a promissory note given by Howkins in payment of a claim for money. Howkins is one of the owners of the Hawk creek mill.
