What God Says
about—FEAR BY INFERENCE

"Fear not ye."

And the emphasis is on the word YE. And there is an inference
that is almost as important as the direct statement. The facts are
these (read them in the 28th of Matthew and you will get them in
fully): On the first Lord's day morning, two women approached the
sepulchre and saw an awesome thing; an angel with a countenance
like lightning came down and rolled away the stone from the tomb.
Now notice, "and for fear of him the keepers did shake and became as
dead men, and the angel answered and said unto the women, Fear not
ye; for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified. He is not here
for He is risen, as He said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay."

It is almost as though he turned and said to the soldiers, "Keep
on shaking, you enemies of God, you may well tremble, for you have
sought to prevent the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ."

Are there any people today who are trying to prevent men be-
lieving in the bodily resurrection of Jesus? If this should fall under
the eyes of any such I pray you read this account in Matthew, with
special reference to the words, "Come, see the place where the Lord
lay." Then I pray you remember the fearful inference of those words
of the angel, "Fear not ye," and then stop and think if you may not
some day be among the trembling enemies of God.

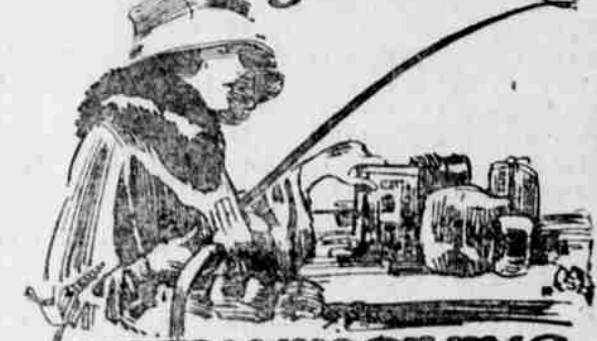

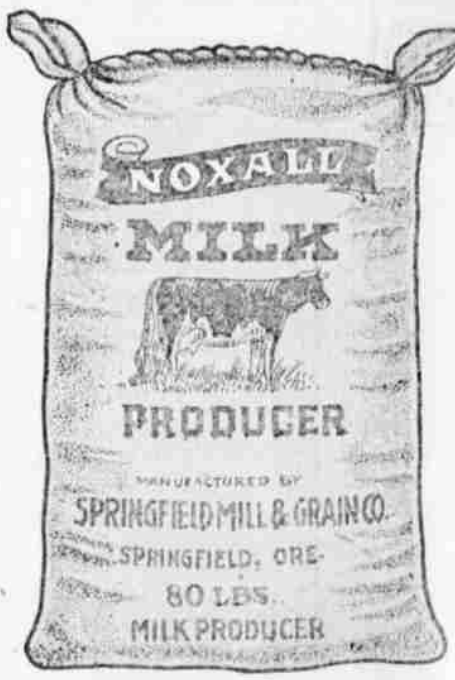
