PICKING AN ALL-AMERICAN FOOTBALL TEAM IS SAID UNFAIR

Henry Farrell Says It Is Not Fair For Experts To Select Eleven Men from the Host of Fine Players

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—(United Press.)—There may be some good excuse for picking an all-American football team, but there are a dozen reasons against that one why the best qualified critic should not attempt the impossible task of selecting the eleven best players from eleven hundred.

The most common excuse is that "I might as well do it, because others do it, and my judgment is just as good." Because Walter Camp gets away with it there are a hundred who try to do the same thing.

All the reasons have been pointed out many times in the past why it means nothing to name an all-American team.

It is impossible for one critic to see all the teams in action. One player looks great on Saturday and the next week he is off. Various methods employed by various coaches bring out a mediocre player and obscure a fine player. Backs of only fair ability shine because they have a great line to "take 'em out" in front of them.

Picking an all-American team is manifestly unfair to hundreds of fine players, who, for mathematical reasons cannot be named on the first team and it is only the first team that really counts.

DEFENSE WINS IN ALIENATION SUIT

The jury in the case of George Cummings against James Andrews, the alienation suit brought from Reedport, returned a verdict in favor of Andrews, who was being sued by Cummings for \$15,000 damages, the plaintiff claiming that Andrews caused the affections of Mrs. Cummings to turn against her husband. Mrs. Cummings on the stand testified that her husband, the plaintiff in the suit, had alienated her affection by his own acts. She claimed that he had on several occasions threatened her life, had beaten and choked her and had in other ways been cruel in his treatment. He failed to provide for her or the children, Mrs. Cummings claimed, and forced her to work to provide support. Andrews frequently loaned Cummings money to pay bills and pay expenses and was very good to the family, Mrs. Cummings said.

The jury received the case late yesterday afternoon, and was out only a short time before returning a verdict in favor of the defendant.
