Women Adopt the Colorful Knitted Tie from the Masculine Fashion

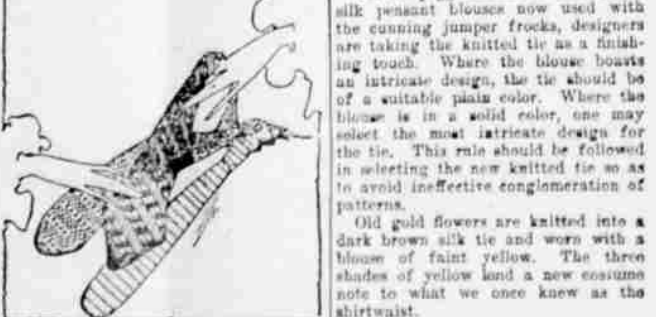

FASHIONS

With the three piece suit dominating the over blouse as distinguished from the tuck-in variety, assumes an important place in the season's mode adds to the charm and softens the winter costume. The shops are displaying a wide and diversified collection, embodying the new fall and winter lines and suitable for wear on any occasion. The autumn blouse borrows from fashion her richest colorings and her most exquisite fabrics. The vogue for velvet is found even in these, but of a soft quality, exquisitely graceful and light. For this garment velvets have been woven especially; chenille, broche and other cut velvets, and produced in smart colors.

The separate skirt plays no little part in woman's wardrobe of today. There are endless varieties from which to choose. Plaid is the vogue and the fabric's pattern has inspired the fashioning of each individual skirt. No matter for what purpose you choose the skirt, there is a separate model, for the business office, the shopping trip, or any occasion of sports wear, you will find them all beautifully tailored and finished. Fabrics include novelty hosiery, overplaid, fancy stripes and camel's hair type. The fall mode for skirts reveals entirely new thoughts in pleatings, bindings and novel use of two tone fabrics. For dress wear, are the silk and velvet skirts.

Blouses are closely allied and should be in harmony with each other, instead of chosen in the hit or miss fashion of bygone days. The manufacturers are aware of this and we have advance information with the skirt makers in evolving a complete costume which will carry out this idea of unanimity, and in the future season there will be no time lost nor effort wasted in hunting for the very blouse to complement the skirt or suit one has previously purchased. The manufacturers will already have selected the right combination for you!

Of Broadcloth A suit of simple material is given distinction by combining it with a tailored overblouse of English broadcloth, white particularly, with Derby, Dab or Tuxedo collar, link cuffs and little pockets, and which can be washed like any ordinary blouse. Radium silk is another fabric of the tailored overblouse in white, wood tones and gray.

By its magic of color and sheen, an appropriate blouse can transform a suit into a formal afternoon costume, or when worn with a satin or velvet skirt, may become an impromptu dinner gown.

Of Crepe De Chine The French touch is given to the blouses of crepe de chine. They are weighted with steel and cashmere beads sprinkled over their surfaces in beautiful designs, and at the scalloping that finishes their lower edge, and are found in light, dark, brilliant or subdued coloring. Printed crepe de chine overblouses in quaint old

beef costs more retail than the other three-fourths, say the packers, and cheaper cuts are much more story when properly prepared than expensive steaks and roasts. Rum, hamburger and round steak should not be despised but exalted, the board holds.

The effort to secure "choice" cuts and not the high cost of raising, shipping, packing and marketing meat is held responsible for meat selling at 40 to 60 cents a pound. If there were more demand for "second" cuts, comparative costs would be equalized, the board claims.

Loins and rib cuts are classified as choice. They are in most demand because they are easier to prepare rather because of tenderness and flavor. On the other hand, shanks, rounds, rumps, flanks, chucks and briskets require longer cooking to be as palatable as the steak which can be cooked by the "hasty" housewife after an afternoon of bridge. The fireless cooker is recommended to remedy that.

Nor should the heart, kidneys, liver, tongue—even the tail—be neglected. These are preferred by the epicures when properly cooked. Ox-tail soup, liver, hearts, brains and sweetbreads supply the needed mineral matter, according to the board, and should be included frequently in the family menu. "Iron" and calcium brains are synonymous, it argues.

Careful study of meat charts, personal trips to market, experimenting with "undiscovered" cuts and preparing meat in a variety of ways are recommended, both for trimming the family budget and improving the family's health.

In selecting the best meat, the board's bulletin offers the following as a guide:

Beef—Firm, of even texture, bright red in color and streaked or "marbled" with fat through the lean flesh. The suet should be white or cream color.

Veal—Less firm than beef and pink in color, with little "marbling."

Pork—Dark pink in color, with the fat less hard than beef suet.

Lamb—Pale or a light, dull red and firm. The fat should be firm and creamy white.

Mutton—Darker red and the fat slightly tinged with yellow.

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—(United Press)—Shoulders, tenderloins, porterhouse steaks and rib roasts would be comparatively 7.50 on the market, if housewives were only more familiar with cheaper cuts of beef, according to the National Livestock and Meat Board here.

One fourth of a carcass of dressed

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
